Torpedoed Sub's Survivor Visits Kin in Roseburg

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Perry of Monterey, Calif., are visiting in Roseburg with Mrs. Perry's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Vierra. Mr. Perry, seaman first class in the U. S. navy, is recovering from the effects of exposure and malaria, having spent 20 days in an open lifeboat and several days in a jungle after the merchant ship on which he was serving as a naval guard was torpedoed by a German submarine in the Indian ocean.

The ship was torpedoed at about 3 p. m. by a submarine which surfaced after the crew of the freighter had taken to lifeboats. The commander of the undersea craft was very polite, Seaman Perry reports, apologizing for the necessity of sinking the craft and offering medical supplies, if needed.

The 20-foot lifeboat in which Perry was adrift was occupied by 15 crew members. Food supplies were very limited and on one occasion when the boat ran into a school of sardines, the men scooped up the fish and ate them raw.

Harder Nearly Mobbed
The boat's steward was almost mobbed when it was found that he had been holding out some turkey and chicken he had salvaged from the icebox as the crew deserted the ship, and Perry intervened to save the man from being thrown overboard.

An attempt was made to sail the boat by compass, until it was learned that the compass was affected by the steel prow of the boat and that progress was being made in exactly the wrong direction.

After 20 days, the party reached land and gained a jungle camp where they were fed by friendly natives and led to an army camp. Perry contracted malaria by drinking jungle water while en route to the camp and has been in and out of hospitals for a couple of months. He is now recovered and will leave this week to return to his base to begin another voyage.

PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Licensing of income tax services by the state was urged by the Multnomah county grand jury today following its indictment of two former operators of a Portland income tax service firm on larceny charges.

The indictments, returned Saturday, charged Nixon O. Chelsty, 56, and Mrs. Mary H.

Siddons, 42, with illegally retaining several thousand dollars which clients had deposited with them for payment of 1943 state income taxes.

Both were held in the Multnomah county jail in lieu of \$6,000 bail each.
