Last Few Weeks Care Important In Turkey Raising

Careful attention by turkey raisers to feeding practices in finishing off their flocks, in selecting birds when they are ready for market, and in timing the various operations of slaughter and marketing will mean more money in the pocket of the grower and better birds for the consumer, says County Agent J. Roland Parker.

After a full season of investment in raising a flock of turkeys, a little extra attention in the last few weeks will make a bigger difference in returns than at any other time, he says. Methods of most successful growers in finishing off and marketing turkeys have recently been summarized by Noel L. Bennion, extension poultry specialist at Oregon State college.

TO EASE MISERY OF CHILD'S COLD RUB ON VICKS VAPORUB

Growers have found that, as with other kinds of livestock, it is a mistake to market turkeys before they are in prime condition, but it is equally poor economy for the producer to hold them after they are ready for market, he says. One reason is that feed costs mount per pound of gain with increasing age. While the average amount of feed required per pound of gain is 4½ pounds, the amount required after six months is from 10 to 12 pounds of feed to produce a pound of gain. For this reason most successful growers examine their birds at intervals to select those in prime condition for marketing, thus saving feed, reducing cost of production, and increasing the percentage of birds in the top grade. Hens, as a rule, mature ready for market two or three weeks before toms, says Bennion.

Experienced turkey growers identify birds ready for market by the amount of flesh on the breast, over the back, around the tail head, on top of the neck and under the feather tracks. Color of skin and freedom from pin feathers, especially on the breast, are other indications.

Use of such supplemental feeds as soaked grains or moist mash are not advocated by Bennion if a well balanced dry ration is supplied. An important point, however, is to see that turkeys receive no grain within 24 hours of slaughtering time and no mash or pellets within 12 hours, as crops must be free of feed when dressed birds are graded. Prompt slaughter is necessary, however, as turkeys begin losing weight rather rapidly after 12 to 15 hours with no feed.

SALEM, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The state supreme court reversed the \$5,000 Marion county circuit court judgment granted to Harold L. Nation in his suit against Dr. H. A. Gueffroy, Salem physician.

Nation, taking his pre-draft physical examination, fainted while being given a blood test by Dr. Gueffroy. In his fall, Nation injured his hip, and charged Dr. Gueffroy with negligence.

The supreme court's decision, by Justice Belt, held that Dr. Gueffroy was not negligent. The case in lower court was before Circuit Judge E. M. Page.

The court ordered a new trial for George Wilson, convicted in Horney county and sentenced to 15 years for manslaughter. Wilson was charged with killing George Manley during a drunken brawl in a night spot in Burns.

October Rainfall Exceeds Normalcy

October weather was slightly above normal in rainfall and was considerably warmer than average, according to the monthly report compiled by J. C. McCallister, meteorologist in charge of the local office of the U. S. weather bureau.

Total rainfall was 3.91 inches, as compared with a normal of 2.61 inches, a total excess of 1.30 inches. Due, however, to the fact that September precipitation was deficient, surplus measured for the two months period was only 36 of an inch. A surplus of 2.27 inches exists since Jan. 1, 1943.

Highest temperature for the month was 85 degrees and the lowest was 38 degrees, while the average daily departure was 2.1 degrees above normal.

Records of the local weather bureau station show October to be one of the most variable of the year in rainfall. The reports since 1877 vary from zero in 1895 to 10.46 in 1924.

Fred A. Fields Faces Drunken Driving Charge

A charge of drunken driving was filed in justice court today against Fred A. Fields, 66, Judge Thomas Hartfield reported. Fields requested time to consult an attorney before entering a plea and was released upon his own recognizance pending final arraignment.

A fine of \$10 paid by Frank E. Perry on a plea of guilty to a charge of operating a motor vehicle with void foreign license plates, was also reported by Judge Hartfield.
