Logger Accused Of Illegally Using N. Umpqua Road

A complaint was filed in justice court today against Howard Johnson, logging contractor, charging dragging logs upon and over a county road without a permit. Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfield reported. The arraignment was continued following Johnson's appearance today, until the court could secure further information concerning the extent of the damage involved.

A plea of innocent was received from Jack Harold Randall, 21, held on a charge of vagrancy.

Edwin L. Davis, 48, was continued in custody in lieu of \$300 and was ordered held for the grand jury on a charge of lewdness. The case, Judge Hartfield said, involved a charge of the writing of obscene notes in public places.

A plea of innocent to a charge of drunken driving was entered

by Fred A. Fields. No trial date has been set.

Silas White, 66, was in custody awaiting arraignment on a complaint charging being drunk on a public highway.

A fine of \$10 was paid by George Wilcox, who pleaded guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle without an operator's license, Hartfield stated.

The governor declined to make a statement regarding any other 1944 campaign plans, but remarked, "I will definitely enter the Ohio primaries as a republican presidential candidate."

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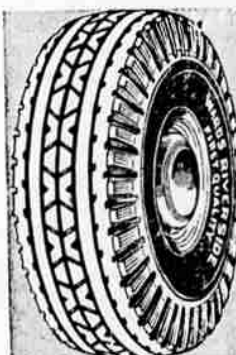
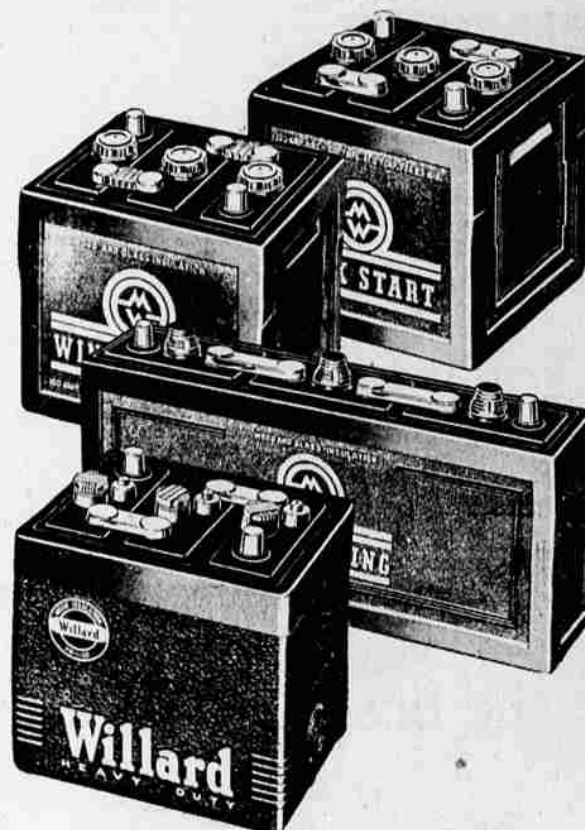
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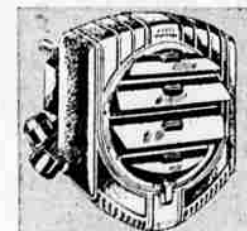
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
