Lebanese Revolt May Follow Govt. Ouster by French

LONDON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Amid disorders and mounting protests, the Lebanese parliament was dissolved today by French Commissioner Helu, who asked former President Eddeh to form a new government for Lebanon, the predominantly Moslem territory between Palestine and Turkey.

The British and Egyptian governments, the Egyptian press and Arab leaders protested yesterday's arrest of members of the government and parliament.

One Cairo newspaper, the British-owned Bourse Egyptienne, proposed editorially that President Roosevelt arbitrate the dispute arising over Lebanon's status.

A representative of the French Committee of Liberation at Algiers said the French view Lebanon as neither a French colony nor a mandate, but in the process of attaining a new status as an independent state linked to France by treaty.

As the Egyptian newspaper Al-Misri proclaimed the French action as insulting the Germans, both Christian and Moslem leaders called on the British minister General at Beirut, Lebanon's capital, to warn that bloodshed would be inevitable unless action is taken to alleviate the crisis.

The Maronite archbishop of Lebanon predicted a revolt unless the British intervene.

British interest in the Lebanese situation was described authoritatively as arising from two considerations:

1. Lebanon is in a strategic area where British forces have responsibility and the British government cannot permit a situation of disorder to develop.

2. In 1941 the British ambassador to Egypt, Sir Miles Lampson, declared his government supported and associated itself with the assurance of independence given Syria and Lebanon by Gen. George Catroux on behalf of Gen. Charles De Gaulle. Catroux was then fighting French communists.

The British government stands firmly by that declaration, it was announced in official quarters.

Jap Destroyers Collide

Thursday's smash was staged entirely by the air arm of Admiral Halsey. After Mitchell's Liberators had moved in the night before to soften resistance by striking at the Yamakanan and Lakama airbases, the daylight blows at 23 warships in or near the harbor were delivered by Avenger torpedo bombers, Dauntless dive bombers and Liberators, covered by Hellcat fighters.

The resultant conflagration was so great that two Japanese destroyers collided while racing for the harbor exit.

FRESH AIR RAIDS HIT REGIONS IN GERMANY

LONDON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—United States bombers, supported by a force of fighting planes, attacked targets in Northwest Germany this morning American air headquarters announced.

The new daylight assault, which the Berlin radio hinted might have been made on the ports of Wilhelmshaven or Emden, kept up the pace of better than a raid every three days which the American airmen have set.

Myrtle Creek Wins 6-Man Grid Title; Drain Beaten, 18-6

The Myrtle Creek Vikings won the Douglas county six man football championship Friday by defeating the Drain Warriors 18 to 6 and will try for greater honors Nov. 16, when they play the unbeaten, untied Rogue River team, champions of Jackson and Josephine counties.

In the game at Drain, the Vikings won the toss and by line plays and marched down the field to Drain's 15-yard line, where a pass from Newton to Wilkins scored the first touchdown.

Drain immediately tied the score, breaking away on a clever reverse play from their own 30 yard strip. Myrtle Creek pushed through to score again near the close of the first half and led 12 to 6 at the rest period.

A Drain tumble in the third period was recovered by Myrtle Creek in Drain territory and paved the way for the final touchdown. The Warriors made two goal line stands during the fourth period, forcing the Vikings back from the one-yard line.

Meat Shipment Hearing Closed

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—The interstate commerce commission's freight rate hearing ended yesterday. Briefs are to be filed by March 1.

A reduction of from approximately \$2.20 to \$1.50 per hundred pounds of meat, sought by midwest packers, interests, was opposed by western stockmen and packers on the ground it would create a price war and knock the bottom out of their markets.

The five-day session concluded with L. M. Peyton, Denver, counsel for midwest packers, attacking the westerners' claim. He asserted that lower meat prices would improve the western livestock industry by increasing meat consumption and enabling cattle raisers to sell more stock.

A much sharper reduction in freight rates on poultry has benefited western producers, he declared, adding that chicken prices in California climbed from 14 to 19 cents a pound after the cut and production increased from 28 to 56 million pounds.

LaMotta Gets Decision In 3rd Bout With Zivic

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Like LaMotta gained a split ten round decision here last night in the "rubber" match of his series with Fejze Zivic, ring veteran of 13 years and 177 scraps. Zivic, weighing 139 to his opponent's 161, won the crowd by putting up such a great fight that his demand for a return bout will probably be granted unless his home draft board decrees otherwise.

ported the Germans abandoning great stores of war gear, eloquent testimony of the disorder of the enemy's retreat. West of Kiev the Russians were within 75 miles of the old Polish frontier Hungary on Verge of Chaos.

Turkish reports said the Russian advance had stirred panic. Especially in Bessarabia. The nervous Hungarians asserted that Hitler was demanding total Rumanian mobilization, promising in return to defend Rumanian borders to the last.

Non-chaos was reported in Hungary itself where guerrillas were said to be making wide swayed raids. The Budapest radio said 100 "communists" had been convicted of subversive activities at one town alone. Growing tension was reported also from Austria, first country still in by Hitler.

Germans and Rumanians entrenched in the hills around Fejze were reported blasting Russian landing operations with heavy gunfire, but aided by a low-hanging fog, red army troops were gradually establishing strong shore positions.

The London radio broadcast a report from its Moscow correspondent, said the Germans already have lost the battle of the Kerch bridgeheads and are blowing up buildings in the town of Kerch in readiness.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Japanese planes, raiding the American base of Nanomea in the Ellice island group, killed one man and wounded two others but caused only minor material damage, the navy announced today.

Approximately a dozen big enemy bombers participated in the raid carried out the night of November 11.

One enemy plane was shot down by anti-aircraft fire.

The bombers presumably came from the big Japanese base at Tarawa in the Gilbert islands, 420 miles away.

Nanomea, in the northern end of the Ellice chain, is approximately 250 miles northwest of Funafuti, first American base established in that island group.

De Marigny "Exonerated" In Lie Detector Test

NASSAU, Bahamas, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Alfred de Marigny answered with an unhesitating "no" when asked during a lie detector test if he killed Sir Henry Gages, Leonard B. Keeler, private criminologist, declared today.

Keeler said the needles of the machine kept on a straight path indicating the truth when de Marigny, acquitted by a Bahamas supreme court jury of a charge of slaying his wealthy father-in-law, answered the question in a demonstration last night.

The lie detector device is not recognized by British courts and could not be used in de Marigny's defense during the sensational 22-day trial which ended with a verdict of innocence Thursday night.

Chinese Inflict Heavy Losses on Jap Troops

CHUNGKING, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Chinese troops with American air support recaptured many towns and inflicted heavy losses on Japanese columns, reinforced to 60,000, along the zigzagging Yangtze-lake-Yangtze river front to central China, the Chinese high command announced today.

Farm Program of New Deal Rapped At Grange Meet

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Demands for the complete elimination of government controls over farm prices developed at the annual convention of the national grange yesterday as a third of the 135 resolutions introduced by delegates condemned government food subsidies.

Not a single resolution, convention officials said, favored the Roosevelt administration's plan to hold down food prices through the use of subsidies to producers.

The sentiment against the administration's programs was so sharp that some of the grange leaders expressed concern lest the convention insist on taking a stand against all price controls.

"I hope," said Albert S. Goss, national master of the organization, "that the grange doesn't go that far. It is essential that we have some controls if serious inflation is to be averted."

Goss, in his message to the convention, criticized use of subsidies at a time when, he said, consumers are well able to pay what it costs to get food produced. He took the view that consumer price ceilings, when used, should be high enough to pay farmers a fair margin.

The convention faced a possible issue in a proposal by Goss that benefits of the social security system be extended to agricultural workers. At the time the social security act was passed, farm groups successfully opposed the inclusion of farm workers largely upon the ground that, because of the seasonal character of farm work, bookkeeping and accounting would be too difficult for farm employers.

Goss told the convention that lack of social security is proving one of the handicaps in holding the highest type labor.

"In self-protection," he said, "agriculture should study practical ways of meeting the difficult problems of making it applicable to farmers."

The convention appeared to be unanimously in favor of a resolution calling upon congress to re-establish federal crop insurance.
