The Enterprise and its crew, the citation reads, accounted for 35 Japanese vessels and 185 Japanese aircraft.

Rebate Spurring Tax Payments in Douglas County

Approximately 60 per cent of the total property tax levied in Douglas county for the current year was paid by the first quarter deadline, Monday, Nov. 15, Mrs. Orlena Slattery, first deputy in the tax collection department of the sheriff's office, reported today. All of the major utilities, timber companies and the greater percentage of individual taxpayers are paying taxes in full this year, taking advantage of the three per cent rebate. Mrs. Slattery reports. Very few partial payments are being received.

The total tax levied this year is \$556,926.79. The collection department already has turned over \$200,000 to the county treasurer and has a large volume of mailed receipts so far unworked. In addition to collections being made on current taxes, a considerable sum has been paid on tax delinquencies, Mrs. Slattery states.

Grange Urged To Endorse Proposed Jap Deportation

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Nov. 16.—(AP)—The National grange convention was urged by its California representative today to go on record as demanding that all Japanese in the United States at the end of the war be deported to Japan.

A resolution calling for such action was pressed by George Schlmeyer, master of the California State grange. He asked favorable action also on a resolution urging that all Japanese camps be transferred from supervision of the War Relocation authority to the army.

The WRA has shown itself incapable, he asserted, of keeping the camps under control. Opposition to the deportation resolution was expressed by National Master Albert S. Goss, who said the state department and the American Red Cross had urged that the matter not be made an issue at this time.

"California farmers are convinced," Schlmeyer said, "that Japanese, whether born in this country or not, are loyal to Japan. The farmers are opposed also to the release of Japanese from relocation camps for work on farms or elsewhere."

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Headquarters of the ninth service command here announced today that no firearms or explosives were discovered by troops ordered to take control of the Japanese relocation center at Tule Lake, Calif.

The announcement, made at headquarters of Maj. Gen. David McCoach, Jr., commanding general of the ninth service command, said "no incidents or signs of resistance or unrest have occurred" since the troops took charge. Headquarters gave no indication how long the army would continue its control.

TULE LAKE, Calif., Nov. 16.—(AP)—A special stockade housed an estimated half-dozen ring-leaders of uprising at the Tule Lake Japanese segregation center today.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported the arrest of the ring-leaders and said they had been placed in the stockade for their part in weekend demonstrations by children against army rule.

An undisclosed number of other internees are held in the stockade but officers would not reveal the reason for holding them.

Fog Epidemic Creates Seattle Traffic Mess

SEATTLE, Nov. 16.—(AP)—This week's continuing heavy fogs, resulting in many traffic

accidents, had caused hundreds of motorists to lay up their cars today and add themselves to the city transit system's already critical overload.

The OPA issued an urgent call for more ride-pools; Mayor William H. Devin called an emergency meeting for tomorrow of the city's transportation committees, and the transit system announced that on four recent days its trolley coaches and gasoline buses carried an average of 504,000 riders a day against a planned peak capacity of 117,000 a day.

The OPA warned of "the grim fact" that the imminent Christmas shopping rush would precipitate a new crisis.
