Western Douglas Doubles Quota in War Chest Giving

The western section of Douglas county more than doubled its quota for the National War Chest. State Senator Thomas Parkinson, chairman of the general committee for the county, reported today. A check in the sum of \$3,095.04 was received today from W. A. Burdick of Reedsport, chairman of the drive in the west Douglas area.

Total receipts for the National War Chest now amount to approximately \$11,000, Parkinson said. Efforts will be made to complete the county quota of \$15,500 by Dec. 1.

Gasoline rationing, Parkinson reports, is making solicitation very difficult, particularly in the rural districts. He requests that contributions be made voluntarily. They may be sent by mail, addressed to the National War Chest, Roseburg Headquarters of the county committee are in the building formerly occupied by the Roseburg Chieftain.
