VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Two men are dead and a third lies critically injured here today from an outfitting dock mishap at the Kaiser company Vancouver shipyard.

The dead were: James A. Baughn, 39, Vancouver, and L. G. Lundberg, 44, Portland.

E. R. Trusty, 45, Vancouver, is in critical condition with multiple fractures. A gun mount on a vest-pocket aircraft carrier slipped yesterday, plummeting the men onto a wooden mooring bumper in the Columbia river.

The fatalities were the 11th and 12th in the yard's 21 months of operation. Yard officials were investigating.

WRA Under Fire In Jap Turmoil; Dies Quiz Asked

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R-N. J.) said yesterday recent events at Japanese relocation centers "make it imperative" that the Dies committee renew hearings "on the un-American activities in connection with the War Relocation authority."

In a letter to Chairman Dies (D-Tex.) of the house committee on un-American activities, Thomas said:

"If, after this hearing, we find, as I expect we shall, that the War Relocation authority is a hopeless muddle, then I shall recommend that the Dies committee meet in executive session, at which time I shall move that a letter be sent to the president of the United States requesting the resignation of Dillon S. Myer as administrator, and that in the future the administration of the camps be placed under the authority of the War department."

The letter, addressed to Dies, added: "My patience is sorely tried as the result of this War Relocation fiasco. Further, the American people deserve more patriotic consideration than has been shown by the coddling of the Japanese in this country by one of our own government agencies. I now ask for a showdown."

JASPER, Tex., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Representative Martin Dies, chairman of the house committee on un-American activities, said today "we are investigating the whole situation and will issue a special report soon" on recent events at Japanese relocation centers.

Mosley's Release Arouses Britons

LONDON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Police broke up a muttering crowd of war workers who marched from Charing Cross station down to Whitehall today to protest the government's decision to release from Prison Sir Oswald Mosley, pre-war leader of British fascists, and reports indicated a nationwide storm was mounting.

London bobbies also blocked the entrance to No. 10 Downing street as some 200 delegates from a suburban aircraft factory sought to gain entrance to Prime Minister Churchill's official residence. The crowd was forced to queue up in the bitter cold to wait outside the home office for permission to see Herbert Morrison, home minister.

Refused permission to see Morrison, a crowd marched up to a spot back of Trafalgar square, where speakers said they represented 40,000 war workers and drew cheers with the declaration, "If Mosley has got to die, let him die on the gallows."
