### RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) for purchase of meats, fats, etc.

DECEMBER 4 — Expiration date of brown stamps G, H, J and K.

JANUARY 1, 1944—Expiration date of brown stamps L, M, N, P and Q. M becomes valid on November 28; N on December 5, P on December 12, and Q on December 19. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

JANUARY 29—Expiration date of brown stamps R, S, T and U. R series valid December 26, S on January 2, T on January 9, U on January 16.

NOVEMBER 30—Period 2 coupons become valid and are good to February 8, 1944.

### RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed fruits and vegetables)

DECEMBER 20 — Expiration date of green stamps A, B and C.

### SUGAR

JANUARY 15, 1944—Expiration date of stamp 29, in book 4, good for 5 pounds.

### SHOES

Stamp No. 18, book one, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES—Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL.—Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

### FUEL OIL

JANUARY 3, 1944—Expiration date of period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations.

### GASOLINE

JANUARY 21, 1944—Expiration date of No. 9 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons.

### TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

## Ration Board of Canyonville Goes In Roseburg Unit

The War Price and Rationing board, formerly maintained at Canyonville, was consolidated with the Roseburg board today, L. V. Hammock, chairman of the Roseburg board reports. Records from the Canyonville office are being moved to Roseburg and all residents of the southern part of the county previously served by the Canyonville board will in the future be served from the Roseburg headquarters with the exception of those residing in an near Glendale.

All persons with a Glendale mailing address will be transferred to the jurisdiction of the Grants Pass rationing board, Hammock stated.

The closing of the Canyonville office was authorized by the state board.

Arrangements are being made, Hammock stated, whereby representatives will be named in each of the principal communities of the county to distribute the various application and report forms, in order to eliminate the necessity of contacting the Roseburg office for such papers.

The chairman also announced that applications for Ration Book No. 4 will not be accepted at the local board headquarters, acceptance of applications having been closed since the recent registration in the schoolhouses of the county.
