CLOTHING QUIZ

Q. Why is old clothing needed?

A. Clothing is needed to aid in the rehabilitation of peoples in liberated countries abroad and for emergency relief purposes here at home.

Q. What percentage of the clothing collected will actually go to the government?

A. Not less than 90 per cent of all clothing collected must be shipped to the government, through its agent, the Defense Supplies Corporation, for allocation by the War Production Board to the most essential foreign and domestic needs in the war program.

Q. What happens to the remaining 10 per cent?

A. The remaining 10 per cent may be distributed to local charitable organizations normally collecting in the area in which the drive is staged for purpose of defraying expenses.

Q. What is the express purpose of this discarded clothing and rag drive?

A. To furnish our government with a discarded clothing "pool" from which it can allocate clothing, on immediate notice, to those liberated countries overseas where, for lack of same, thousands of peoples may die from exposure.

Q. With the cream of the old clothing "crop" harvested, will provision be made for emergency domestic needs should we have a flood or similar disaster this winter in some section of the United States?

A. Definitely. The government will maintain a home-front reserve "stockpile" at all times to guard against just such eventualities.

Q. Why are rags needed?

A. Rags are desperately needed by our armed forces and industry for wiping cloths and other essential uses.

Q. In this drive, should we donate clothing which we can still use?

A. No. Anything which the owner knows will be used now or in the immediate future should not be salvaged nor "turned in" for this collection. Only DISCARDED CLOTHING—clothing "out of the attic," not "from the closet," . . . that clothing the owner no longer intends to wear, is wanted in this drive.

Q. Is infant's clothing wanted, as well as men's and women's?

A. All types of clothing are needed for men, women, boys, girls and infants. Also, any unwearable clothing which can be reduced to rags is wanted.

Q. Are there any specific types of clothing NOT WANTED in this drive?

A. Shoes are not wanted. Nor rubber, rubber boots, overshoes, galoshes, slippers, leather leggings, leather gloves, hats, caps, neckties, collars, garters, garter belts, suspenders, belts, girdles, corsets, brassiers, vests, spats, rubber coats, diapers and masquerade costumes. NONE of these are wanted.

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Q. Should I turn in my clothing "as is?"

A. No. It is specifically asked that woolen garments be thoroughly brushed and that cotton garments and rags be clean prior to turning them into a collection center. Mending is not required.

Q. What organization is in charge of this program?

A. The Salvage Division, War Production Board, is staging this drive. In Oregon, volunteer county and local salvage committees are in charge of the program in conjunction with churches of Oregon which have been asked to sponsor collections.

Q. How long will this drive last?

A. This is a two-weeks "drive" beginning Monday, November 22, and extending through Saturday, December 4.

Q. Will someone call at my home for my old clothes and rags?

A. No. collection facilities are not available. As your part in this war program you, as an individual or as the head of a family, are being asked to take your donations to the nearest collection center.
