Price Hikes Allowed For Cedar, Larch-Fir

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30—(AP)—Western States producers of larch-fir, inland red cedar and incense cedar lumber today were authorized by the OPA to add \$3 per 1,000 board feet to the price of 12 grades of these lumber.

The price agency said the permitted increases reflect recent wage increases and upped costs in the industry.

The OPA also announced that the \$3 addition to maximum prices of western pine lumber would be continued.

Poison Alcohol Deaths Bring Official Warning

NEW YORK, Nov. 30—(AP)—The deaths of three persons from drinking bad alcohol were reported today by Dr. Alexander O. Gettler, city toxicologist, who warned there might be more "unless the better grades of liquor are put back on the market."

Recalling that at the height of prohibition there was an average of 20 deaths from poisonous liquor a week, Dr. Gettler cautioned drinkers against consuming strange beverages if legal liquor, now scarce, was unobtainable.

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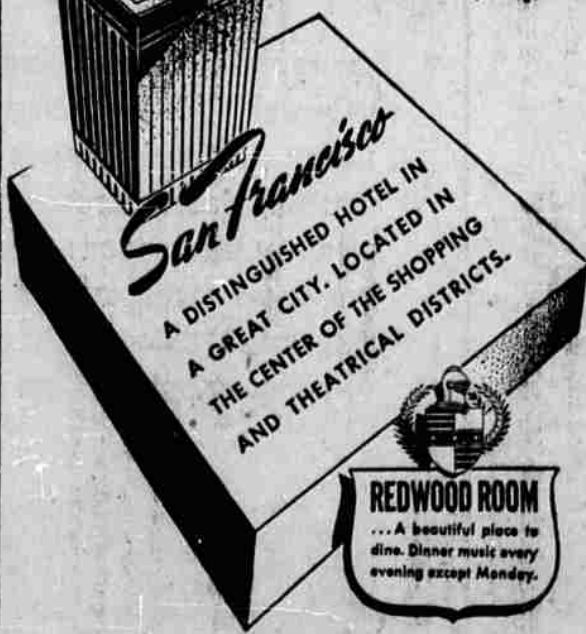
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
