Railway Pay Increase Gets Committee O. K.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The senate interstate commerce committee voted its approval

yesterday of a resolution by Senator Truman of Missouri authorizing a flat 8-cent-an-hour pay increase for 1,100,000 non-operating railroad employees.

The committee's action steered toward the senate floor the long-pending controversy that grew out of the rejection of the pay boost by Economic Stabilization Director Vinson.

Vinson proposed instead a sliding scale of increases of from 4 to 10 cents an hour.



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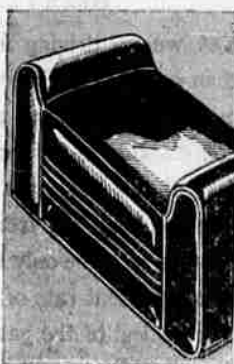


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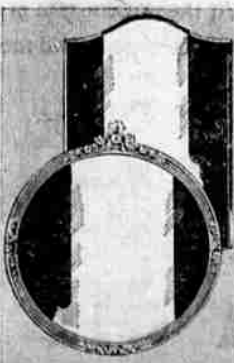
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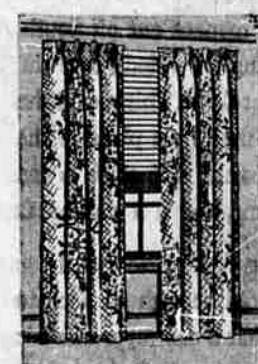


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
