Unpaid Fines Send Four to Jail Here For Public Sprees

Fines of \$50 each were imposed in justice court today upon Edward Cook, 20; Bert Lehnher, 18; Richard E. Whittaker, 26, and Lauren Denny, 20, who were taken into custody last night by the state police. The four pleaded guilty, Judge Thomas Hartfield said, to charges of being drunk on a public highway. Failure to pay fines imposed by the court, they were committed to the county jail.

Eston Dumond, 19, a member of the armed forces, who was on furlough, was taken into custody, but no charge was filed. Instead, Judge Hartfield said, he is to be turned over to military authorities.

Other fines reported in the justice court included Robert Burns, \$25, speeding, and Wiley M. Whitaker, \$20, overloaded truck.

Pending for arraignment was the case of Austin Pendergrass, charged with trespass. He is at liberty on \$25 cash bail.

Land Possession at Issue in Trial Here

The suit of Mae Riley versus J. W. Dovie, charging failure to comply with terms of a real estate lease, occupied the circuit court today. The action is one of which the plaintiff is endeavoring to recover use of the land held by the defendant, charging that stipulated rentals were not paid in accordance with terms of the agreement.

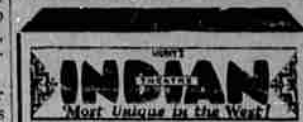
The defense claims payments were made for specified periods, and that those claimed to be delinquent were tendered but were refused by the land owner.

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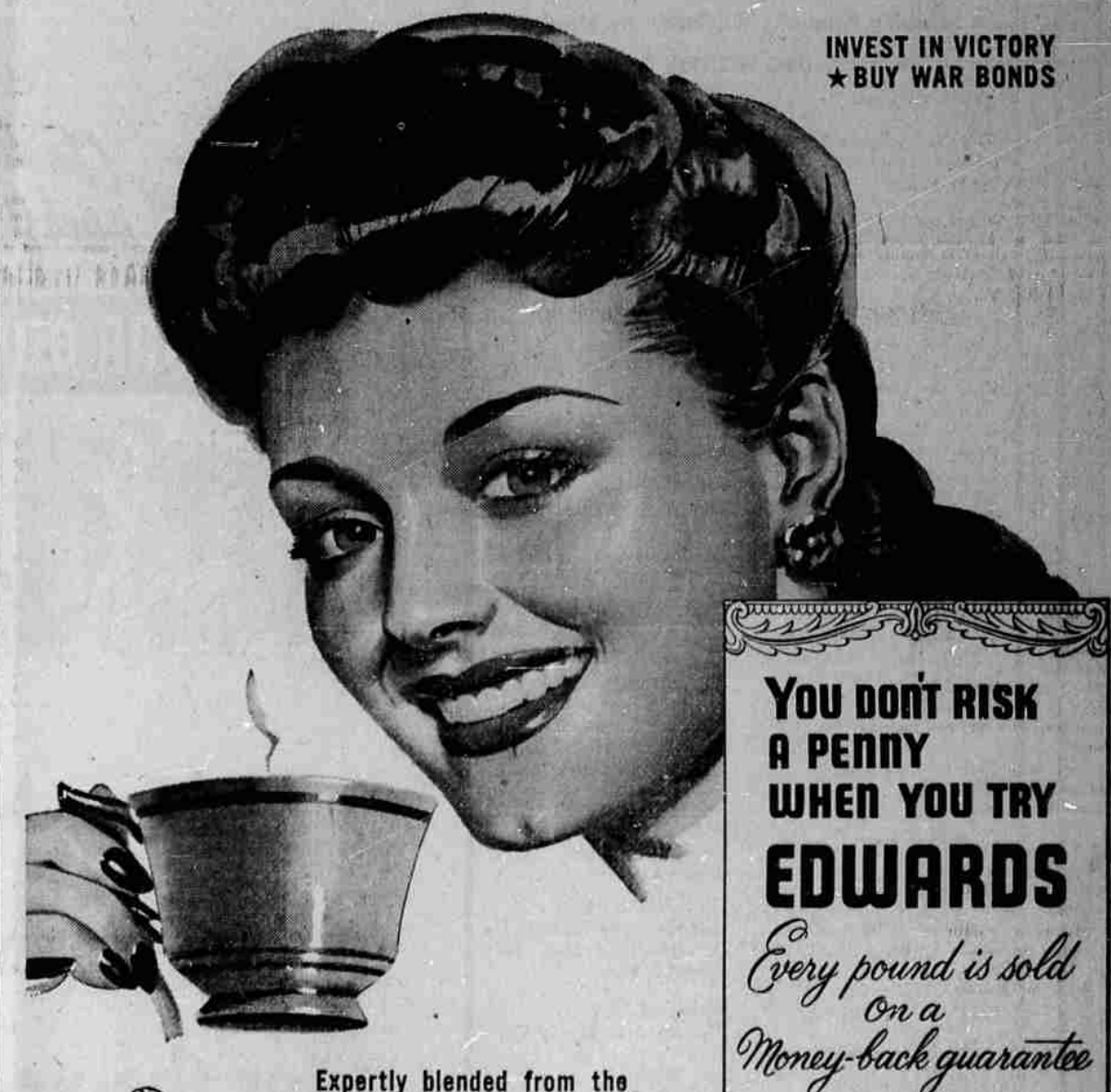
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
