Cut Holiday Trips, S. P. Requests of Public

Anticipating heavy demands from furloughed service men and women for train accommodations during the coming holiday period, Southern Pacific is appealing to civilians to limit themselves to most urgent trips during the period December 17 through January 10.

"We expect that more than 80 per cent of our train space will be requested by service personnel and essential business travelers," said F. S. McGinnis, vice president in charge of passenger traffic. "Also there will be heavy demands for tickets to training camps by relatives of men who are unable to obtain furloughs. Old Berry Canes Bear Leaf Spots; Early Spray Urged

Early removal of old canes and sprayin' gearily in the year with lime-sulphur constitute the best control yet found for the common leaf spot of cane fruits, which in Oregon is more or less severe on loganberries, youngberries, boysenberries, and other types of trailing blackberries, reports Dr. S. M. Zeller, plant pathologist at the O. S. C. experiment station.

In a revision of a former circular of information Dr. Zeller says that the sources of infection are the spots on the old leaves and canes, hence the sooner they are removed after the crop is harvested the better.

The most satisfactory spray so far found is lime-sulphur in the strength of 10 gallons for 100 gallons of spray. This is applied once in February or March, after the old canes have been cut out and the new fruiting canes have been trellised.

The appearance of the disease varies with different varieties. On some the spots are light brown, ranging in size from small spots to those an eighth of an inch in diameter. The disease is most serious in the Willamette valley and along the coast, while in drier sections it causes little damage.

Doyle, seeking ejection from property leased by the plaintiff and contending violation of the terms of the lease agreement, was ended when Judge Wimberly upheld the defendant's motion for involuntary non-suit. The defendant contended the plaintiff's testimony failed to show the alleged violations of the lease.

GASOLINE OUTLOOK

A recent OPA survey of the gasoline supply situation indicates that farmers will probably continue to get enough fuel to meet essential requirements, but further sacrifices are in store for civilians.

The mounting offensive in the Pacific backs up OPA's plea for the greatest caution in the use of gasoline—even for essential uses. Farmers are asked to hold off-highway allocations for tractors, combines, etc., to a strict minimum. Conservation now, says OPA, means more gasoline in the leaner days ahead when military needs increase.

Food Scientists to Be Honored in Film Drama



A motion picture short, "The Modest Miracle," providing a dramatic and authentic description of the work science and the baking industry are doing to improve the nation's diet, will be shown in Roseburg and Sutherlin theatres.

The film will be shown at the Indian theatre December 8 to 11 and at the Rose theatre from December 9 to 11, and will be at the Rand theatre, Sutherlin, December 15 and 16.

The film, produced in Hollywood with a cast of well known players, ties in directly with the federal government's program for better nutrition.
