

Teheran Accord Meets General Approval in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull, whose trip to Moscow paved the way for the epochal tri-power Teheran conference, hailed the Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin joint statement of allied war aims today as the signal for concerted action against Germany.

"These concerted plans will undoubtedly result in making effective to the fullest extent the fighting strength of all the United Nations," Hull said in a statement.

Similar expressions came from the halls of congress as Washington, London and Moscow made public the official version of the conference.

Senator Gillette (D-Iowa) observed, however, that the statement on postwar cooperation to keep the peace "could have been somewhat more specific."

Commenting legislators agreed generally that the meeting on the chiefs of state alone was a mighty step forward for the United Nations.

Other comment: Senator Smith (D-S. C.)—"They had better be careful about the commitments they are making. The senate is going to have something to say about those commitments later."

Senator Nye (R-N. D.)—"A few men seem to be shaping a beautiful world for the future. I sincerely hope their announcements are backed not only by words but by a sincerity of purpose and determination that can stand up and endure when victory comes."

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.)—"Everyone is in favor of the general principle of a world family of democratic nations. That is an ideal we should work for. But as I have heretofore pointed out, the first step should be to work out an economic United States of Europe where our wars have originated. I hope the conference marked out details that will do much to bring that about."

VENTURA, Calif., Dec. 7.—(AP)—Death has taken Pitcher Charlie Hall, remembered by veteran baseball fans for the famous mound duel he and Christy Mathewson of the New York Giants had in the 1912 world series when a game went 11 innings to a 6-6 tie.

Charlie, 58, member of the Boston Red Sox team that won the series that year from the Giants, died at home yesterday after long illness.

In addition to the Red Sox, Hall pitched for Cincinnati of National league and Seattle, Los Angeles and Sacramento of the Pacific Coast league.

He is survived by his widow, Marie and two sons.

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Influenza's Toll In Britain Heavy

LONDON, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Influenza claimed 376 lives in London and other large cities in Britain during the week ending Nov. 27, it was disclosed today, more than tripling the number of fatalities recorded during the previous week.

Health authorities, describing the current influenza wave as the worst since that of 1937, which caused 2,000 deaths weekly at its peak, acknowledged that the number of cases was rising steadily.

The ministry of health said it could not estimate the number of those taken ill, but office and factory staffs—especially in the midlands—were reported hard hit.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Influenza cases by the hundreds were reported over the city today, causing a sharp decline in school attendance and resulting in scores of vacant desks in business offices. Physicians said, however, the disease appeared to be of a mild nature, and that victims were confined to their homes for a few days to a week.

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METLADEHYDE SLUG PELLETS

Weather conditions have been most favorable for the growth and reproduction of the common gray garden slug.

At this season of the year, when legumes and other grass seed crops are just sprouting and coming through the top soil, hordes of these pests attack the young seedlings and soon the farmer is faced with the job of replanting his field.

Slugs work at night and generally the damage is done before the farmer is aware of his trouble, so we suggest he make tests in his various fields to determine their presence.

Simply scatter a few Regal Brand Slug Pellets and mark the place where applied, then in 24 hours check the results.
