Pre-War Father Draft Delay is Approved

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They said the object of the bill is to delay drafting of fathers until all available single men have been drafted. This is the policy followed in Oregon since the creation of the selective service system.

In January, between 30 and 50 per cent of Oregon draftees will be pre-war fathers, marking the start of the father draft in this state on a large scale.

A collective bargaining election will be held at the Orwest Lumber company mill at Myrtle Creek, Dec. 15, it was announced today by L. L. Coggeshall, field examiner for the National Labor Relations board. The election is called to determine whether the employees are to be represented by the C. I. O. or A. F. of L. woodworking affiliates.

Mr. Coggeshall is arranging the details of the election and will supervise the voting.

Theft Charge Faced by Substitute Mail Carrier
