Girl Acquitted In Killing of Kin During Nightmare

BURLINGTON, Ky., Dec. 22.—(AP)—Amid cheers in a crowded rural courtroom, Joan Kiger, school girl, was acquitted by a jury last night of murder charges in connection with the slaying of her 6-year-old brother, Jerry.

After the verdict, Commonwealth Attorney Raymond L. Vincent, who led the prosecution, asked that all other indictments against the 16-year-old Joan, and her mother, Mrs. Jennie Kiger, 49, be dropped. Circuit Judge Ward Yager granted the state's request.

Joan and her mother were accused of murder in connection with the slaying of the boy, Jerry, and his father, Carl C. Kiger, 49, Covington, Ky., vice mayor, at the family's summer home last August 17.

Joan testified during the trial that she was awakened by the sound of shots, ran to her parents' room and saw "an intruder" firing a pistol at her parents.

John H. Henderer Of Elkton Passes

John H. Henderer, 78, well known pioneer resident of Elkton and Douglas county, passed away at Keizer hospital in North Bend last evening, following a short illness. He was born on the homestead at Elkton, October 11, 1865, and has continuously resided there. He was very active in community affairs up to the time of his death and was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving are three daughters and two sons: Mrs. Fannie M.

Clemo, Mrs. Una Smith, Charles G. Henderer and Newton Henderer, all of Elkton, and Mrs. Carrie Ross, of Drain.

Services will be held at the Christian church in Elkton, Thursday at 1:30 p. m., with interment at the Henderer cemetery. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

Entry in Senator Race Considered, Morse Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Wayne L. Morse, public member of the War Labor board said today he was considering entering the race for the republican nomination for U. S. senator from Oregon in the state's primary next May.

"I am giving very favorable

consideration to the idea as a result of a tremendous amount of support wired to me from Oregon during the past 48 hours. If I should become convinced that I could make a greater contribution to the public by resigning from the WLB and running for the senate, I shall do it," he stated.

The Oregon seat in the senate now occupied by Senator Holman, republican, will be at issue in next year's Oregon campaign. Holman was elected in 1938 for a six-year term ending Jan. 3, 1945.
