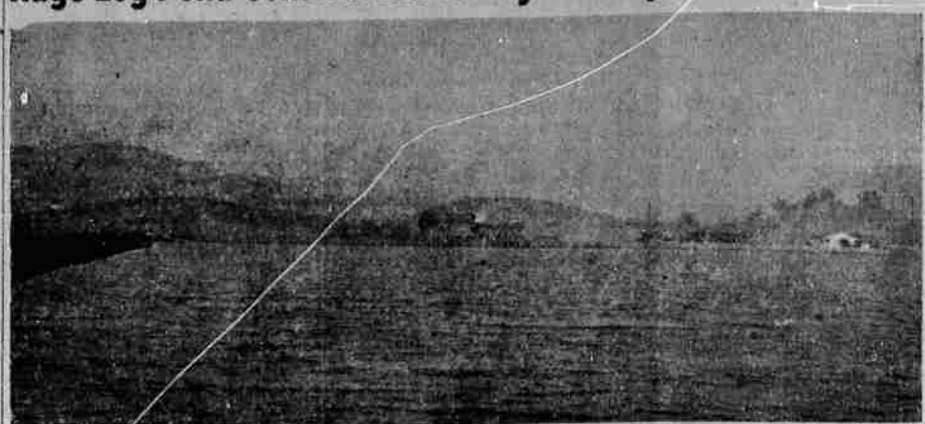

Huge Log Pond Constructed for Plywood Operations at Green

Pictured herewith is the 15 1/2-acre log pond completed by the Eugene Plywood company last fall at its big holdings at Green, four miles south of Roseburg. Entrance to the property is from the old highway, near Green school.

Forty thousand cubic feet of dirt were moved from the bed of the pond by means of heavy lifts and bulldozers. About two-thirds of it was used in the retaining walls of the pond, the remainder

in the fill over which the spur track through the mill property was laid from the nearby main line of the Southern Pacific railroad.

The sub-soil was of heavy clay, T. F. Skoog, engineer for the plywood company, informed me, and being dry at the time of excavation was extremely difficult and costly to handle. "Relatively easy, (not average) excavation," he continued, "now costs about 26 cents per yard. Our's ran nearer 75 cents. Our investment at Green, including the mill proper-

ty of the pond and crane, the railroad spur and rocked roads, approximates \$50,000."

Often I have wondered how many board feet a big pond might hold, and I have received many answers. However, "a pond," Mr. Skoog told me, "will hold a million feet of good peeler logs per acre; about 400,000 feet of ordinary sawlogs."

The size of a peeler log varies; but it is a top quality log, with fine grain and small knots. The bigger its bulk, the better the lumbermen seem to like it.

Famed Artillery Song Ruled Public Property

BOSTON, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The United States circuit court of appeals has ruled that the famed artillery marching tune "The Caisson Song" was not copyrighted by its composer, Brigadier General Edmund L. Gruber.

The song also is known as "The Caissons Go Rolling Along" and "The Artillery Song."

Court officials said the decision

had the effect of dedicating the song to the public. A New York music firm claimed Gruber had assigned the song to it and sought an injunction against a Boston music company on the contention the latter had infringed the copyright. In line with its finding, the court denied the injunction.
