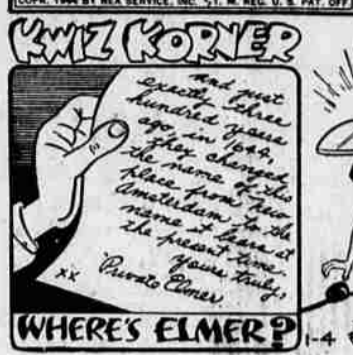
BIRTHDAY DINNER IS ENJOYABLE AFFAIR

THE OUT-LOOK FOR 1944
Trying to look ahead into 1944 seems to us a lot like trying to see through these early morning fogs we have been having lately. It's all pretty hazy. For the immediate future, we can see some keen disappointment for the poultryman. Our guess is that egg prices are due for a sharp drop, which may develop before this is printed. There are several reasons for this, and one of them is just that it always happens every year. In other words, when the hens get into production, the price of eggs must come down. As to the other reasons, we don't like to cuss the bureaucrats, so won't discuss them. Eggs going down and feed going up presents a picture that takes all the joy out of being a poultryman. So, many flocks may be liquidated. If it goes too far, chicken prices will drop too. Then the demand for hatchling eggs will slow up, which will increase the pressure on market eggs. Eventually, it will sum up to less poultry meat and less eggs for next year, and the man who sticks it out will cash in, as usual. So, our advice to the poultryman is to stay with the ship. Egg prices will be supported at a level that will not cause bankruptcy, and our guess is that you will still be in the income tax group if you keep right on sawing wood.

1943
Here it is the last day of the year 1943, and as manager of this concern I wish to thank our customers for their patronage and for their endurance, and I mean just that. It has been a tough year—tough on our customers, their stock and poultry, and tough on us—who have tried to hold things together by making feed out of SOMETHING, and believe me it has not been easy. For the first time in 25 years we have had to ration out feed to our customers. A lot of folks were, and I presume still are, very bitter because we did not let them have all the feed they wanted at any and every time they came to the mill. Our job was to get all of the supplies we could beg borrow or steal, make it up into feeds and then distribute it among our customers in such a manner that everyone have feed so that their stock would not starve or be stunted in growth. We did our best, and many of you know that the regular customers of this concern had feed when plenty of others had none. There have been numerous times when we felt like giving up the ship, but our country happens to be at war and food is necessary, so we have just sawed wood and hoped you folks would understand and co-operate, and most of you have.
