Right to Bar Jobs To Communists is Claimed by Board

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The civil service commission contended yesterday it has authority to refuse government employment to communists despite a prohibition against investigating applicants' political philosophies or affiliations.

The commission said in a statement that the appropriations act for 1944, and the Hatch act forbidding pernicious political activities, provided the authority to "inquire as to a person's formal affiliation with the communist party or as to his adherence to the communist party line."

The commission suggested that it had the unquestioned right to inquire whether applicants were pro-fascist, pro-Nazi or pro-Japanese, and added: "The relationship between such inquiries and the legislation passed by the congress is obvious."

The statement added the commission's policy was no reflection against the Russian soviet government but "simply a frank recognition of the fact that a man can not serve two masters."

The commission explained that the statement was intended to clarify its own instructions to field representatives prohibiting investigation of job applicants' political opinions and affiliations. This prohibition, it said, did not prevent denial of employment to persons advocating overthrow of the government by force.

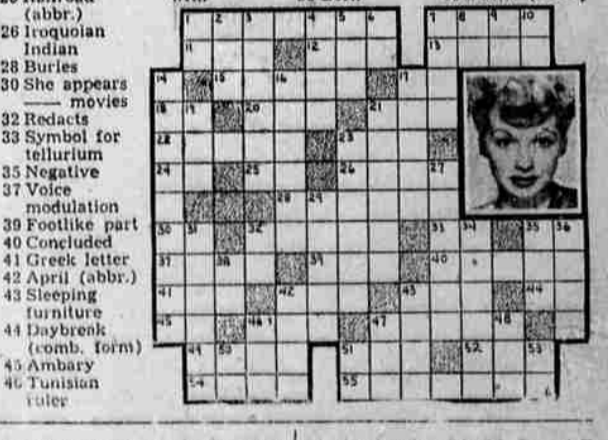

RATION BOOK NO. 4 (Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.) JANUARY 20, 1944—Expiration date of green stamps D, E, and F.

SUGAR: JANUARY 15, 1944—Expiration date of stamp 29, in book 4, good for 5 pounds.

SHOES: Stamp No. 18, book one, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES: Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL: Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL: FEBRUARY 8, 1944—Expiration date of period 2 coupons which become valid November 30.

GASOLINE: JANUARY 21, 1944—Expiration date of No. 9 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons. Value of gasoline coupons—A.

B1, C1, 3 gals.; B2, C2, R and T, 5 gals.; D, 1.5 gals.; E, 1 gal. TIRES: Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.
