Japs Won't Fight to End, Chinese Envoy Declares

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Japan will not fight to the bitter end. Her strength is brittle and she will seek peace after her first great defeat. Thus declared Dr. T. F. Tsang, director of political affairs in the Chinese cabinet, China's delegate to the United Nations' Relief and Rehabilitation Conference in Atlantic City recently, and former Chinese ambassador to the Soviet Union.

Here in the interval of postwar Chinese development, Dr. Tsang predicted the American and British fleets will smash the Japanese fleet and that the BURMA Road will be reopened. Japanese shipping and cities attacked, and the Japanese blockade broken. Then the end will come quickly, he said.

"When the war ends, our trade with your Pacific coast will be enormous," he said. "we will need 10 times as much lumber from you as we ever bought in the past."
