

Control Prices, Subsidies on Sales of Cattle Listed

More complete details regarding cattle price stabilization program indicate that it consists of both price supports and price ceilings associated with subsidy payments to slaughtering establishments, according to information received from official sources at the agricultural extension service at Oregon State college. The subsidy payments are contingent upon the slaughterer paying average prices within the maximum and minimum prices allowed for each grade of cattle within each of several geographical "zones".

Zone one includes markets in Oregon, Washington, and California, except Spokane, and the maximum prices announced are \$16.75 for choice grade, \$15.95 for good, \$13.70 for medium, \$11.65 for utility, \$8.80 for canners and cutters, and \$10.15 for bologna bulls. The medium prices are \$15.75 for choice grade, \$14.95 for good, \$12.20 for medium, \$10.15 for utility, for cutters, \$7.30 for canners and cutters, and \$8.65 for bologna

Sawmill Job Expertly Filled

The mill now is cutting about 100,000 feet daily, according to E. J. Looney, manager, and has construction well under way which will enable it to increase this figure materially. Seven or eight million feet of sawlogs now lie in the millpond, which is of 20 acres extent and soon to be enlarged to a 30-acre pond. The mill secures its sawlogs from the Smith Wood Products holdings on the Calapooia east of Sutherlin. Peilers cut there are shipped to the Smith mill at Coquille.

'Home Test' for WAVE Prospects: Ten 'Aye, Aye's' Needed To Pass

WAVE-minded girls, wondering about their eligibility, may give themselves a simple "home examination" and get a good idea of whether they would be acceptable for this branch of the U. S. Navy.

It isn't an infallible or complete test, of course, but if a girl can answer these ten questions affirmatively, she can be reasonably confident the WAVES will be glad to have her:

Can you prove you are a citizen—native-born or naturalized?

Are you between 20 and 36? (If 20, written consent of parents or guardian is necessary.)

Are you single, or married and without children under 18? (Wives of enlisted men are eligible, but not wives of Naval officers from Ensign on up.)

Can you furnish three character references? Have you attended high school or business school for at least 2 years?

Are you at least 5 feet tall and do you weigh at least 95 pounds, with weight in proportion to general body build?

Can you read with either eye at 6 feet and with both eyes at 12 feet what perfect eyes can read at 20 feet?

Can you hear whispered words at 15 feet? Are your teeth sound? (Dental replacements are no bar.)

Will your physician give you a statement that you are in good health? (A thorough examination by Navy doctors is given later.)



WAVE aspirants answering "yes" to these questions, or who are in doubt, should write, visit or telephone the Navy Recruiting Station or Office of Naval Officer Procurement. Ask for a copy of the new WAVE booklet giving complete information about pay, ratings, duty, living quarters, etc.

bulls. The maximum and minimum prices at Spokane are all 15 cents lower than the foregoing.

Subsidy Rates Listed.

Slaughtering who pay average prices within the range of the maximum and minimum prices for each grade in their respective zones will be entitled to receive the full subsidy allowed; but if the average paid is higher or lower the slaughterer will suffer deductions, according

to the amount paid over or under the stabilization prices established.

The basic subsidy payments announced per hundred live weight are \$100 for choice, \$145 for good, 90 cents for medium, and 50 cents for the lower grades. In addition, a special subsidy payment of 80 cents per hundred live weight is authorized to certain "nonprocessing" slaughterers.

The OPA and the War Food Administration administer the program jointly and have announced standard dresser carcass yields for each grade. These are at least 61 per cent for choice grade, 58 for good, 56 for medium, 45 for utility, 45 for canners and cutters, and 53 per cent for bologna bulls.

Slime Eels Threaten Shark Liver Industry

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Shark fishermen feared today their lucrative sales of vitamin-rich livers were being destroyed by slime eels.

The eels have been found inside sharks caught in coastal areas where the sea floor is muddy. Dr. E. L. Packard, director of the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology, said they destroy the commercial value of shark liver. California and New Zealand have the same problem, he said.

Half Grown Hogs Better Fed Out Than Liquidated

Farmers with feeder pigs on hand already weighing around 100 pounds will probably make more money by feeding them out at the present unfavorable grain-hog price ratio than by liquidating feeder prices, says H. A. Lindgren, extension livestock specialist at Oregon State college.

Present price of feeder hogs is approximately \$9.50 to \$10 on the farm. Protein supplements are high priced and difficult to obtain. More grain is required per pound of gain if protein supplements are not used. Lindgren points out, a farmer who has half-grown feeder hogs on hand can figure that it will take from five to six pounds of grain to put on a pound of gain if protein supplements are not available, compared with four to four and a half pounds with supple-

ments. If a 100-pound hog were sold at present prices it would bring approximately \$10. About 500 pounds of grain would be required to increase the weight of this 100-pound feeder to a 200-pound market hog, when it would be worth, at present prices, approximately \$27 on the farm, or an increase of \$17. If grain can be had at \$50 per ton the cost of feed for this gain would be \$12.50 as compared with the increased value of \$17.

These figures apply only to hogs ready to go into the fattening pen and are not applicable to hogs raised from the weaner stage.

Lindgren also calls attention to the possibility of making use of waste products such as cull fruits or vegetables, which have a definite value when combined with grain, though it does not pay to feed these alone. All such products are best fed in the raw state, with the exception of potatoes, which are improved by cooking. Use of such by-products will replace a portion of the grain otherwise required.

Proposed Closing of Aluminum Pot Lines Resisted

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—(AP)—A meeting to forestall any further moves to close Pacific northwest aluminum pot lines is being held here today.

The Pacific Northwest Aluminum committee, composed of representatives from Portland, Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane, Salem, Vancouver and Longview, called the session.

Representatives of the War Manpower commission Bonneville administration, the Oregon department of geology and the Oregon committee on postwar plans were invited to attend. A number of pot lines in the east were ordered closed recently by the War Manpower board. Closures for northwest plants al-

so were reported under consideration.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Because our allies are in worse shape than the United States for manpower, the War Manpower commission last night suggested that arrangement be worked out with England and Canada whereby aluminum production there be curtailed before it is reduced in this country.

The War Production board last week ordered the closing of four

aluminum production lines because of the increased aluminum supply.
