Belgians Told to Stay Home During Invasion

LONDON, Jan. 6 (AP)—In the name of the United Nations High Command, the British Broadcasting Company radioed pre-invasion pleas to the Belgians today to remain in their homes when Military operations get under way.

"If you are on the roads, you will obstruct Allied Air Forces which must be free to attack the enemy's communications," the broadcast said.

"If, on the other hand, you hamper the movement of the Germans they will shoot you down ruthlessly. Stay in your homes. . . Anything is better than the roads."

The broadcast further advised the Belgians to dig slit trenches and to build dugout shelters.

PORTLAND, Jan. 7 (AP)—A juvenile consultant in each of Oregon's counties would go a long way toward curbing the rising tide of delinquency among the younger generation.

That's the opinion of a state advisory committee which is making recommendations to the Governor's committee, created to cope with the problem.

The advisory group suggests coordination of local activities by communities and appointment of a field secretary for statewide supervision.

RATION BOOK NO. 3
(Brown Stamps) for purchase of meats-fats, etc.

JANUARY 1, 1944—Expiration date of brown stamps L, M, N, P, and Q.

JANUARY 29—Expiration date of brown stamps R, S, T and U. R series valid December 26, 5 on January 2, T on January 9, U on January 16. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 4
(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)

JANUARY 20, 1944—Expiration date of green stamps D, E, and F.

SUGAR
JANUARY 15, 1944—Expiration date of stamp 29, in book 4 good for 5 pounds.

SHOES
Stamp No. 18, book one, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES
Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL
FEBRUARY 8, 1944—Expirations date of period 2 coupons which become valid November 30.

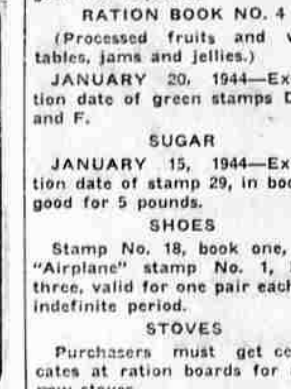
GASOLINE
JANUARY 21, 1944—Expiration date of No. 9 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons.

Value of gasoline coupons—A, B1, C1, 3 gals.; B2, C2, R and T, 5 gals.; D, 1.5 gals.; E, 1 gal.

TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months.

Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.
