

Jas. Dolan, Pioneer Drayman, Passes

James Dolan, 80, resident of Douglas county for more than 50 years, died at Mercy hospital Saturday following a long period of ill health.

Born in Manatick, Canada, Aug. 15, 1863, he came to Douglas county as a young man and engaged in logging near Gardiner. He later moved to Roseburg and started a draying business, and became the first Standard Oil company manager in the Roseburg area, making deliveries with horse-drawn vehicles. He was later engaged in the sand and gravel business.

Surviving are two sons, Edmund Dolan, Roseburg, and William Dolan, Pendleton; and two sisters, Miss Anna Dolan and Mrs. Elizabeth Ford, Chicago, and a brother, Patrick Dolan,

who resides in Canada. Reclamation of the Rosary was conducted at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel Sunday evening. Services will be conducted by Father William Coughlin at St. Joseph's Catholic church at 9 a. m. Tuesday and will be concluded in the Catholic cemetery.

to conclude that about 50 per cent of them favored the republicans in the 1944 presidential campaign.

Spangler's statement that four lieutenants and captains who were old political and personal friends of his had passed this information along at his request created some apprehension in the ranks of party faithful who feared democrats might want to know how the officers involved could take time off for such a survey.

Today's formal session of the committee was expected to select Chicago as the 1944 convention city, and to set June 25 as the date. Preliminaries will be concluded tonight at a dinner at which Rep. Charles A. Halleck of

Indiana, will speak. The convention arrangements committee expected to be named by Spangler tomorrow, will meet Wednesday to organize what would be the party's 12th convention in Chicago.

"Party Locusts" Flayed

Meanwhile party stalwarts were buzzing over the Vermont governor's statement that several old line republican leaders were "four-year locusts" who threatened party prospects for 1944 victory.

The governor, William H. Willits, in a radio address Saturday night listed Alfred M. Landon, 1936 presidential candidate; John D. M. Hamilton, manager of the '36 campaign; Joseph Pew, Pennsylvania financier; Sen. Nye (R-N. D.); Gerald L. K. Smith, Huey Long's protégé; and "the metropolitan Patterson-McCormick newspaper axis" as the "locusts" that threaten to blight the party's chances.

Strongly backing the candidacy of Wendell L. Willkie, Willits said, "What worries me is that this promise of victory is working against our final triumph next November."

Here he issued his listing, and added, "I cannot believe their voices are the voice of the resurgent republican of 1944."

"The latter is forward looking. He seeks to build and strengthen. He wants ours to be a better world."

"Locusts on the other hand bring nothing but destruction. These political locusts of whom I speak had nothing constructive to say. They agreed on no candidate. They simply agreed in their hatred of the outstanding republican of our times—Wendell Willkie."

Spangler said he would not comment on the message, but Ralph H. Cate, national committeeman from Oregon and a pre-campaign manager for Willkie, termed it a "fine and courageous speech."

In Philadelphia, Hamilton, characterized Willits as "ill-advised by those who assisted him in preparation on this speech," and added he would ask the radio system, which carried the address, for time in which to reply in detail.

"I feel sure that in a spirit of fairness this time will be granted," Hamilton said.

Later in New York the radio system said Hamilton had been given from 7:45 to 8 p. m., PWT Saturday, Jan. 15, on its network to reply to the Willits address.

Innocence Plea Made On Drunken Driving Charge

Willis F. McAfee, charged with drunken driving, and Eric N. Ahlberg, accused of being drunk on a public highway, pleaded innocent to the respective charges when arraigned today in justice court in Roseburg. Judge Thomas Hartfield reported. Both were continued in custody in lieu of bail. McAfee's bail being fixed at \$500 and Ahlberg's at \$100.

Loren L. Denney, recently fined \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail on a charge of being drunk on a public highway, was released from custody after serving the jail term and paying the fine.

Other fines reported by Judge Hartfield to be paid into the justice court included Steward E. Thompson, \$10, no operator's license and \$10, no vehicle license; Arthur Wridge, \$25, drunk on a public highway.

Former Resident of Sutherlin Passes Away

Mrs. Margaret Campbell, widow of the late James C. Campbell, long time residents of Sutherlin, died Saturday, January 8, 1944, at Nyssa, Ore., where she had made her home for the last two years. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Politics Get Attention At CIO Convention

Ignored and Glenn has been designated to continue in organizational work.

Assessments of 25 cents per month for a period of six months have been recommended by the executive committee and are being collected by numerous locals to provide a war chest to finance the C. I. O. participation in the May primary election in Oregon. The convention was informed, a considerable sum already has been collected, and with the primaries only four months away, it was the opinion of officers that active work should be under way. It was voted that unless a national officer is assigned to Oregon by Saturday of this week to direct the political participation, the funds designated for that purpose shall be turned over to the state committee on political action rather than to the national committee.

Ray Atkinson, Seattle, regional political action director, who came under convention fire, announced he would recommend to the national headquarters that the transfer of Glenn from organizational to political action work be immediately ordered.

The convention also turned its guns on the 12th regional War Labor board at Seattle, contending that the board has failed to give proper consideration to applications for wage adjustments and has acted in an arbitrary manner. Either a complete change in personnel or abolishment of the board was demanded.

Nominations Made

Robert Baker, Portland, was nominated to serve as president of the council for the coming year. He was unopposed, as Ernest Baker, who has served for two years, announced he would not again be a candidate because of his appointment as secretary of the longshoremen's union of Portland, which demands his full time. Ray Brown, Portland, incumbent, was nominated for vice-president and will be opposed by Russell Bock, Troutdale. Stanley Earl, Portland, was unopposed for reelection to the office of secretary-treasurer.

Members of the executive council are to be chosen from each of four districts. District No. 1 includes the lower Columbia basin, District No. 2 embraces all of southwestern Oregon, District No. 3 is the Klamath basin, and District No. 4 embraces all the balance of the state, including Portland. One director is to be chosen from each of the first three districts and three are to be selected from the fourth district. Nominations were as follows:

District No. 1—Guy T. Haney, Seaside; Earl Edmundson, Siletz. District No. 2—C. F. Hume, Waldport; Ray Lea, Roseburg. District No. 3—Joe Huber, Bend; Ray McClain, Ramsay. District No. 4—Frank Brown, Joe DePietras, Jess Bell, Wm. Tantum, Joe Joergeson, Howard Beasley, all of Portland.

The election will be conducted by mail. Paul Smith, Ronald Rowley and Pete Leovitch, all Portland, were named to the ballot committee, with Don Downing and Neil Griffin, Portland, alternates.

would get first consideration when the revenue measure is called up—possibly tomorrow. Congress must race against time, even in the absence of calendar deadlines, on many portions of the legislative program.

Soldier Vote a Problem
A practical system of absentee voting for servicemen at home and overseas is one of the most pressing problems. Ballots must be printed and shipped months ahead of the November election, and if the states are to be called upon for enabling legislation, their lawmakers must have time to draft and pass the necessary bills.

Senators Lucas (D-Ill.) and Green (D-R. I.) think they have a short-cut solution in a federal ballot system. A similar plan is backed by Chairman Worley (D-Tex.) of the house elections committee. However, the senate already has approved a leave-it-to-the-states resolution, which will be considered by the house committee along with Worley's proposal tomorrow. Lucas substitute will be considered by the senate privileges and elections committee Wednesday.

House Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts predicts that some sort of workable voting machinery will be set up, but he has not announced which plan he will back. Democratic Senator Russell, whose home state of Georgia last week enacted an absentee soldiers' voting law, has given his tentative endorsement to the Lucas plan.

Must-Off Pay at Issue
Another soldiers-and-sailors problem involves mustering-off pay, already needed by a majority of the 75,000 men who are being discharged each month. The senate has passed a measure providing lump sum payments of \$200 to \$500 for discharged vet-

erans below the rank of generals, with length and site of service governing the amount paid.

The house military affairs committee is to consider the senate bill tomorrow.

More legislation, giving veterans credit on the social security rolls for time spent in the service, will get the green light early in the session, Senator George predicted.

The president's message may determine whether congress will consider anti-strike legislation, widely discussed since the government seized the railroads to avert a threatened walkout.

Postwar planning to ease the transition from war to civilian production is due for detailed study by half a dozen committees. And of course a series of appropriation bills will be forthcoming.

Drive Slated Against Unendorsed Gas Stamps

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—A drive against the use of unendorsed gasoline coupons will be started Saturday by the district OPA.

Rationing officials will check coupons deposited at banks by oil companies. Service station operators who persist in accepting unendorsed coupons will have their gasoline supplies reduced by the amount of unendorsed coupons, the agency said.

Motorists in Oregon and southwest Washington will have to reduce gasoline consumption if they hope to secure new B and C mileage rationing, says the District OPA. Ration boards will start the new check Jan. 15.

Into the red army ranks went a record Polish division.

The suddenness and speed of the Russian advance was declared by Swedish correspondents in Berlin to have disrupted German plans for a methodical retreat in the Ukraine and German propaganda could no longer hide the plight of nazis arms.

Sofia Again Bombed

A heavy force of American Flying Fortresses bombed Sofia, the capital of Bulgaria, today. It was the fifth bomber assault in two months on the German controlled capital. The raid was a close follow-up to yesterday's first announced Fortress operation from Italian bases, when the port and naval base at Pola in the Northern Adriatic area was hit severely.

Sofia is a rail center for German troop and supply movements in Yugoslavia, Rumania and Bulgaria, while Pola is a shipping center used by the Germans to supply their Yugoslav front.

Fifth army men slugged through the Italian mountains within four miles of Cassino, key to Rome on the main highway, the Via Cassina. Troops advanced two miles from Mt. Maio, and took Vecchio ridge.

Americans won Mt. Porchia, southwest of newly won San Vittore. Britons of the Fifth army forced the Pecora river west of Mt. Maggiora. All these points were on the hard outer defenses of Cassino.

The Eighth army on the Adriatic was bogged down by deep snow drifts below Pescara.

Mr. Kurtz was born in Wayne county, Iowa, April 14, 1862, and was married to Margaret Rosetta McCoy at Corden, Iowa, January 25, 1884. He moved from Clarion, Ohio, with his family to Douglas county about 43 years ago, making his home near Glendale. Mrs. Kurtz died in November, 1941. Mr. Kurtz was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving are three sons, and one daughter: Roy Kurtz, Roseburg; Mrs. Floy Myers, Hubbard, Oregon; Walter Kurtz, Roseburg; and Leslie Kurtz, Portland, Ore. A sister, Mrs. Mary Garrett of Salem, Oregon, a brother, Ezra Kurtz, of Iowa, five grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren also survive.

FUN FOR THE MILLIONS

We always like to give you a "little joke in the Feed Bag." Nowadays, "Corn" is the big joke. You hear it on the radio, see it in the movies, and even this little article will be "corny." Like the old moonshiner, down in Tennessee who thought his field of corn might "go about six gallons to the acre."

Here are some highlights from a recent article in "The Wall Street Journal":

"A buyer in Illinois deliberately overestimated a crib of corn, then paid the legal ceiling price, based on this overestimate."

"In Wisconsin, the newest dodge is to buy corn in the shock, at \$1.50 per bushel, and agree with the farmer that he may make small shocks, which won't shake out a bushel per shock."

"In Iowa, the buyer pays legal price for corn to the farmer, then pays a large 'shelling and hauling fee' to the farmers' son."

"From Nebraska, a story that the buyer pays ceiling price, then hands the farmer a neat bonus in cash, on the side."

But here is the real pay-off: "At Falls City, Neb., the ceiling price, based on Kansas City, LESS freight, LESS 1c is 95c. At Reserve, Kan., just five miles across the state line, the ceiling price, based on Kansas City, PLUS freight is \$1.11. The 'cheerful' farmer takes his corn to Kansas to sell it, and makes 16c cents a bushel for the five mile trip. And that's legal."

"But the Falls City farmer can't buy corn locally. So he goes to Reserve, Kan., buys back his neighbor's corn at \$1.11, plus an 8c elevator markup, and besides has a hauling charge to pay."

"Elevators at Benkelman, Neb. can pay farmers 92c; at
