nation ever possessed. Starting with a few obsolete and practically worthless military planes, we now have an air force that is fighting effectively on every global front.

WE have built merchant ships faster than the enemy submarines and bombers could sink them. The exact figures are a military secret, but there is good reason to believe that we are now building more airplanes than all the rest of the world put together.

WHILE we have been doing all this for ourselves, we have been supplying our allies with immense quantities of food, weapons and civilian necessities. That is a record that can hardly be termed a FAILURE.

THE president's proposal puts us to this question: Shall we abandon, in the midst of our war effort, at the moment when continued production on an efficient scale is critically necessary, our American system of voluntary production which has served us and our allies well, in spite of its faults, and substitute for it a system that is alien to us?

It is a fateful question. We'd better ponder it well.

THE president offers his universal proposal as a means of preventing strikes. It might do that. But, while preventing war-time strikes, it might also result in actual reduction of war-time production. DRIVEN labor has never been tried in this country.

It might not work as well in practice as our own purely American system (with all its admitted faults) has worked.

WE FAIL BY \$1,000

DOUGLAS COUNTY has lost its record for oversubscribing its monthly war bond quota. Month after month, since the quota system was first established, Douglas county reached its goal and had a margin to spare. We failed in December, and it is a heart-breaking failure. We were just \$1,005 short of the mark. Our quota was \$161,050. Our purchases amounted to \$159,944.75. The first week in January saw sales amounting to several thousands of dollars. Some of those purchases, if made a few days earlier, would have enabled the county to maintain its unbroken record.

While we were buying almost \$160,000 worth of bonds during the month of December, we were at the same time increasing our deposits in the bank by more than five times that much. Bank deposits in Douglas county showed a very high gain during December. We didn't fail to buy that extra thousand dollars worth of bonds because we lacked the money; we failed because we put the money into the bank vaults instead of into the purchase of bonds. We failed because we were not sufficiently prodded and pushed into the act of making out an application to buy bonds. During December there were so many other activities to demand our attention that we neglected to do our duty and, as a result, we fell short of our goal by \$1,000.

If we had failed by \$10,000 we might not have felt so disappointed. But to think that only \$1,000 stood between us and our goal is what hurts. Many people have since bought bonds of \$1,000 denominations. Many were planning during the last few days of December to buy bonds, but just delayed acting. Now Douglas county can no longer point with pride to its record of being the only Oregon county which met its quota every month. Our mark of distinction is gone.

We are now entering the period for the Fourth War Loan campaign. We are asked to raise \$549,100. Nearly twice that amount went into bank deposits last month. Here in Douglas county we have around twelve million dollars deposited in our banks—almost double the prewar deposits.

We cannot make the excuse that we haven't the money with which to buy the bonds the government asks us to purchase. If we fail to reach our Fourth War Loan aims it will be because we are not willing to take our dollars out of idleness and make them fight for the welfare of our country.

It should not be necessary to prod us into our patriotic duty, but it seems we will not act without urging. A strong committee has been formed to direct the Fourth War Loan campaign within the county. A group of patriotic business and professional men, who have banded together in the Roseburg Victory Council, and who have won widespread attention and commendation for their assistance by war aid advertising, are firmly backing the program.

The committee and the Victory council will be putting forth special effort to produce action. Your cooperation is essential. We must not have a repetition of December's failure. We have twelve million dollars with which to buy a half million dollars worth of war bonds. There is no reason why our goal could not be reached tomorrow if everyone bought the amount of bonds he is able to buy.

Someone's procrastination in December cost us a record in which we had great pride. Don't be the one who causes the county to miss its Fourth War Loan goal.
