Since September 1, 1943, 7272 dressings have been made in Glendale. The surgical dressing rooms at Azalea are open every Friday from 10 to 4 o'clock. Mrs. Ethel Smith and Mrs. Cecil Wenderoth are in charge of the room near the Clare Lumber company; Mrs. John Jantzer and Mrs. Frank Young are in charge of the room on Starveout creek.

Since April 23, 1943, 40,249 surgical dressings have been made here.
