Nazis Claim Raid Costs Americans 136 Planes

tions of how they assertedly broke
up the attacks. The DNB agency
quoted a Berlin spokesman as
saying:
"More than a third of the
enemy planes which penetrated
into Germany were brought
down, with a loss of more than
1,000 men."
"The extraordinary success is
called a landmark on the way to
perfection of Germany's air de-
fense."
Of the so-called new defense
tactics, DNB said:
"When the first German ob-
servation posts were crossed an
alarm was given to a chain of de-
fense stations which went into
action in accordance with an
elastic plan."
"The enemy formations thus
passed from hand to hand. The
attack was so broken up by
stages that it failed to bring con-
centrated weight to bear upon
its objective."
The Evening News speculated
that American losses might have
been 60 bombers—possibly on the
basis of last October's attack on
Schweinfurt, Germany, when
that record loss was suffered.
The Germans at that time claim-
ed 123 planes downed.
Meanwhile the Scandinavian
Telegram bureau's Berlin cor-
respondent said there was specu-
lation that Nazi planes were
equipped with a new secret de-
vice which improved their effec-
tiveness in combatting the heavy
bombers.
3-Hour Battle Fought
The Germans admitted the loss
of only nine planes.
A preliminary U. S. commu-
nique issued last night said merely
that targets in northwest Ger-
many had been attacked and that
"strong fighter opposition" was
encountered. This announcement
gave no figures on plane losses,
but a supplementary statement
said that the mission had turned
into a three-hour running battle
and that the bombers were sub-
jected to continuous attack going
to and from the target.
"The Germans threw in virtu-
ally every type of aircraft that
could give battle to the bombers
and their assault was vicious and
determined," the statement said.

James Henry Porter, 72. Funeral
services were held Tuesday.
Mr. Porter, a charter member
of company C, 1st Infantry, Ore-

ficers reserve despite his advanc-
ed years.

they would prefer.

Monday and Tuesday showed
Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of N.
Y., 21.
Wendell Willkie, 21.
Gov. J. W. Bricker of Ohio, 5.

son, 4.
Senator Robt. Taft of Ohio, 2.
Gov. D. H. Green of Illinois, 2.
Gov. Earl Warren of Califor-
nia, 2.
General Douglas MacArthur, 1.
Dewey or Willkie, 1.
The poll also brought out that
23 still were open minded on the
subject.

ter what the cost, in order to
avoid a major calamity not only
in the Dnieper bend but as far
west as Odessa. The war is al-
ready being brought closer to
Rumania as Vatutin's troops con-
tinue their march down the
Ukrainian steppes toward the
Odessa railway, thus threatening
to throw the Germans back on
the resources of that satellite na-
tion.
The Nazis, dispatches said, have
been able to bring in reserves in
divisional strength, despite their
reverses of the past two weeks,
and these fresh units have taken
up the fight under new com-
manders who have been rushed
to the front to try and halt the
red army offensive.

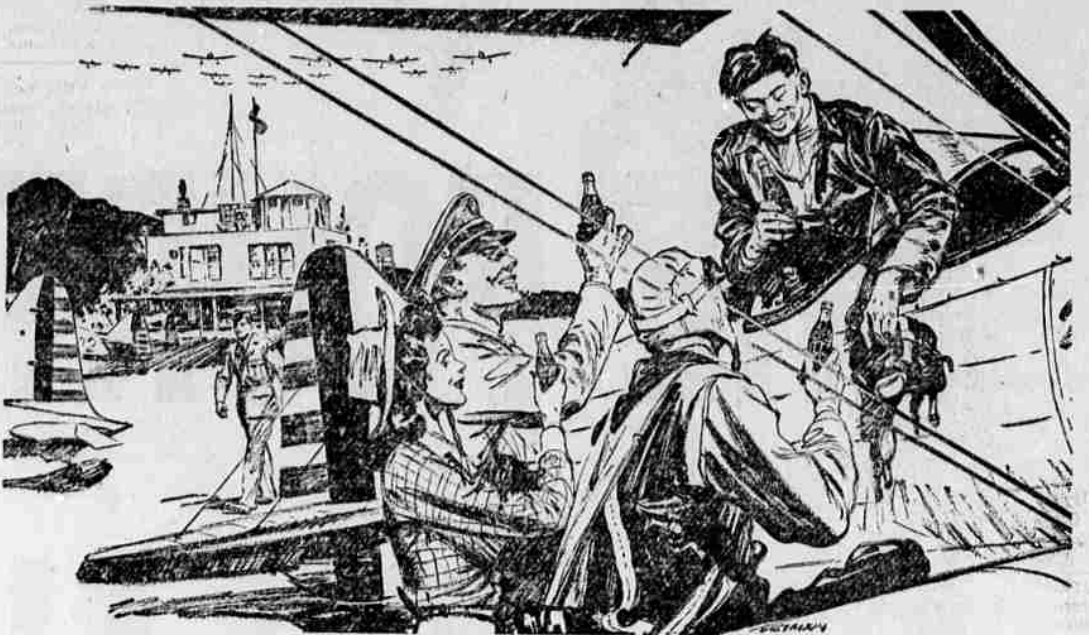
face of two enemy counter-

Australian troops across the
Vittaz strait in New Guinea up-
rooted a strong Japanese rear
guard with mortars, artillery and
tanks, and pushed across the Buri

river on the Huon peninsula
coast. They have moved to with-
in 60 miles of U. S. Sixth army
forces at Saidor, 55 miles south
of the Nipponese base at Ma-
dang.
Allied bombers pitched into

supply dumps and other installa-
tions around Bogadlim, south of
Madang, with 76 tons of explo-
sives. Other planes, striking at
defenses in the Madang area,
blasted the Alexishafen airdrome

and attacked Japanese supply
and troops barges.
A single Catalina flying boat
scored a hit amidship on a Japane-
se destroyer in an attack on a
six-ship enemy convoy in waters
off Kavieng, New Ireland.
