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New Equipment

Boosts Output at Patterson Bakery

Installation of new equipment, greatly increasing production capacity, has been completed at Patterson's Model bakery, which has recently been completely remodeled. Replacing the brick oven used for many years, George Patterson, owner-manager, has installed the latest type of automatic tray-type, gas-heated oven.

This electrically controlled equipment provides rotary trays which are kept in constant movement to provide uniform heat throughout. Temperature is thermostatically controlled.

The new oven, Patterson states, provides perfect baking conditions at any desired heat.

He also has installed an air conditioned proofing room, in which air is washed and circulated, with temperature and humidity automatically controlled.

In addition he has secured other equipment and machinery to speed preparation of dough, as well as handling and wrapping the finished product.

William Beard, formerly with the Interstate bakery, Los Angeles, has been employed and will work with Charles Ensley, employed as oven man for many years.

With the new equipment, Patterson states, the bakery is now producing its bread during the night shift and making deliveries to local retail outlets in the early morning.
