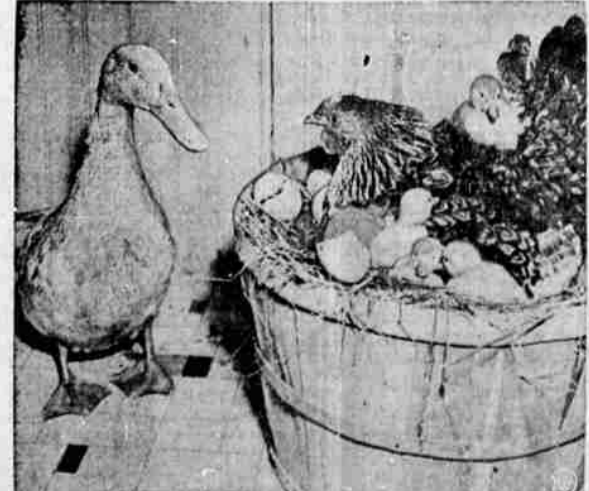

State's 4-H Farm Safety Champion

NONDAS MARIE HUGHSON, 16, of Albany, has been named by the state club office as Oregon's most outstanding 4-H Club member in safety work during 1943, for which she receives a \$100 War Savings Bond from the Mennen Company.



The girl's achievements in the current national 4-H farm safety activity included: Kept toys, clothes, etc., off stairs and in their proper places. Made hooks on which to hang hay fork, hoe, and other tools, glued broken leg on chair, kept wet leaves swept off sidewalk, handles of pans turned towards back of stove, and moved woodbox from near the stove to porch. She also put matches in tin box in cupboard, as well as kept glass, nails, etc., picked up from yard and put in container. . . . This is the first year of the activity, which is designed to help reduce the annual losses of 18,000 farm people killed through accidents, a \$22,000,000 worth of rural property destroyed or damaged by fire.
