

Newcomers Force Extra Visit For License Tester

Ward McReynolds, district examiner in the license division of the state motor vehicle department, will make a special stop in Roseburg Wednesday, Jan. 19 from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. and Thursday, Jan. 20, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, he announced today.

The examiner's schedule provides for three consecutive weekly stops in Roseburg, skipping the fourth week. His stops are made on Wednesdays. Due to the large amount of overflow business, however, he has arranged for service here Wednesday and Thursday of this week, which would be the week he ordinarily would make no visit.

Mr. McReynolds and his assistant, Mrs. Marie Kohlhaugen, he reports, have handled from 65 to 75 applications each Wednesday for the past three weeks. Jan. 12 they had 78 applications. Of that number 24 failed to pass the examination and will return for later tests. The average grade of those passing the law test was 83 per cent. The average grade of those passing the driving test was 80 per cent.

Fifteen of the applicants were applying for their first license, 10 had been previously licensed in Oregon, 10 applied for chauffeur's licenses, already having Oregon driver's licenses, and the balance, a total of 43, were persons who are newcomers holding licenses in 10 other states and the Territory of Hawaii.

The outstanding feature of recent license applications at Roseburg, McReynolds states, is the great preponderance of persons who have moved into the community from out-of-state and must secure Oregon licenses. The number has been growing so steadily that the work of conducting the examinations is harder at Roseburg than at any other point on the circuit.

Four forms were snatched on one blood-soaked bed Saturday when police entered the shoe shop. Head cuts had caused the death of T. P. Dillon, 38, operator of the shoe, and Mrs. Jane Stables, 26, and injured Dillon's wife, 34, and Frank Stanish Winnett, 32, critically.

Order Maintained in Albany Theater Fire

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Although flames consumed 6,000 feet of film in the projection room of the Venetian theater last night, most of the 400 patrons refused to leave until convinced the show could not go on.

A few, who became panicky when smoke was noticed, were ousted quickly by attendants. The operator escaped from the metal-lined projection room without injury but motion picture machines were damaged to an extent which may prevent reopening the theater for a week.

"Brace and Bit" Burglar Captured by Civilian

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 17.—A resident Sunday captured a man sought by police for six months as Vancouver's "brace and bit" burglar.

Howard Lee, 43, was accused by police of prowling approximately 25 Vancouver residents after gaining entrance usually with a brace and bit.

Petrolman Pat Morrow said Lee admitted some of the burglaries. Lee has a prison record at Folsom and San Quentin, the officers said.

Ken Williamson chased and captured Lee after seeing him leave a neighbor's residence.

Roosevelt Loses Ten Pounds During Flu Siege
