Poultry, Turkey Growers' Meeting Set in Roseburg

Meetings for poultry and turkey growers are announced by J. Roland Parker for Tuesday and Wednesday, January 18 and 19, in the K of P. hall in Roseburg. The meetings will start at 10 a. m. with poultry experts from the State college discussing marketing outlooks, feed situation and production problems.

Poultrymen will meet on Tuesday and turkey growers on Wednesday. With state and national goals already set for poultry and turkey production in 1944, it is important, states Mr. Parker, county agent, that growers be informed as to the war needs and the outlook for available feeds.

The national goals for 1944 compared with 1943 are as follows: two per cent more eggs, 4 per cent fewer chickens raised and 16 per cent less commercial broiler production and 3 per cent less turkeys. Oregon goals for 1944 compared with 1943 are as follows: 4 per cent less eggs, 1 per cent less chickens raised, 25 per cent less broiler production and 8 per cent fewer turkeys produced. The reason for the greater reduction in Oregon is due to the fact that the state is in a deficient feed area.

Mrs. Wanda Thornton Of Drain Passes Away

Bigger Supply of Rationed Food for Schools Promised

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Children will get larger amounts of rationed foods in school meals, the OPA said today in announcing revised ration allowances for schools serving meals meeting certain complete nutritional standards set by the food distribution administration.

Schools now may apply to local war price and rationing boards for allowances of rationed foods on the basis of the number of persons served in January and February and the amount of food currently used, rather than on the amount of food used in December, 1942, the base month for institution users' allotments.

OPA said that a reserve of food points equal to 25 per cent of the January-February allowances can be obtained for adjustment purposes until exact allotments are determined.

These newly available allowances should represent an appreciable increase in meat and processed foods for most of the 60,000 schools under the FDA school lunch program, OPA said.

Schools not under the FDA setup may obtain similar increased rations on the basis of comparable standards of meals served and the number of persons served, OPA added.

Douglas Electric Cooperative Sets Annual Meeting

The fifth annual meeting of the Douglas Electric cooperative will be held February 7, at 1:30 p. m., in the K. of P. hall, Roseburg. George Cordray, manager,

announced today. Mr. Cordray said that the meeting will be the most important event of the year for the cooperative's 1027 members. The program will include the elections of a board of directors for the coming year and the reports of officers on the progress made by the cooperative during the past year.

Mr. Cordray pointed out that the cooperative has extended electric service to farms wherever

possible, as part of a program to encourage the best use of electrical labor-saving and food-producing equipment along its lines. Since January, 1943, War Production board regulations have authorized the connection to rural power lines of nearby farms able to use electrical devices in livestock, dairy and poultry production.

The cooperative now operates 393 miles of rural distribution lines in Douglas county.
