Ellsworth Favors State Ballot Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Representative Ellsworth of Oregon suggested last night that the soldier vote issue simmered down to whether service people were to "have a complete and legal state ballot or a short and legally doubtful federal ballot."

He declared that the federal ballot plan of Senator Lucas disregarded the constitution, which "definitely states that the qualifications of voters for federal officials must be determined by the several states."

"If enacted into law," Ellsworth added in a radio speech, "it would permit the men and women in the armed forces to write a ballot for president, vice president and senators and representatives in congress, but provides not the slightest assurance that any such ballots would be counted—hence voted."

He called for passage of the state ballot plan as a simple, workable and constitutional way of giving the service men an opportunity to vote a real ballot that will be counted on election day.

This plan was offered by Representative Pursell (R-Ill.) as an amendment to the senate bill.
