Roseburg school students have expressed considerable enthusiasm for the Community Concert association being formed in Roseburg this week and thirty-five volunteer workers have been engaged in the student group to obtain student memberships in the association. World-famous artists will be brought to Roseburg in three concerts, the first of which will be the evening of January 29, when Columbia Concerts, Inc., present Dorothy Maynor, outstanding negro soprano.

Miss Maynor is singing this week in Los Angeles and will spend next week in San Francisco, arriving here on the 29th to present a concert, before going to Portland for an engagement.

The association feels especially pleased to have this great artist present a concert in Roseburg. There will be no admission tickets sold to any concert, as only membership holders will be privileged to attend. Adults memberships are \$5.50 and student memberships are \$2.20.

Leading civic organizations of Roseburg are cooperating in sponsoring the association. ### Lunch Program for Schools Subject of Conference Here

Mrs. Dorothy Rapp, federal foods commodities distribution agency representative from Portland, has been conferring at the office of City School Superin-

tendent W. M. Campbell in the interests of the school lunch program for the Roseburg school district. Through the assistance of this agency the high school which has been able to supply the dishes which are offered the students at a lower cost than would otherwise be possible. Miss May Murphy is the general supervisor of the high school cafeteria in Roseburg.

Plans are also being made with the school district through this agency to again operate a school milk program during the second semester in the elementary schools. This program is to be sponsored and assisted by the Roseburg Kiwanis club. Last year the club sponsored a similar program in the three public elementary schools, the St. Joseph's school, and the Adventist school in Roseburg, supplying a total of 50,000 one-half pint bottles of milk to the students during the second semester.
