Numerous promotions recently have been made in Company D, 162nd Infantry, former Roseburg national guard company, now in Australia, according to a letter received today from Olaf H. Peterson, former News-Review stereotyper. Peterson formerly was first sergeant of the Roseburg company but was transferred out to attend officer candidate school. He was prevented from taking the officer training course, however, when he suffered an attack of malaria, and has been assigned as first sergeant of a company in the reconditioning center.

He states that the weather is extremely warm, and that hotter weather is anticipated in February.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Withdrawal of an international Woodworkers of America (CIO) picket line around the Rayonier, Inc., plant at Hoquiam, Wash., and the immediate return of all employees to work was ordered last night by the War Labor board.

Chairman William H. Davis said in a telegram to union officials:

"The National War Labor board will take such action in this case as it deems appropriate to obtain enforcement of its decision."

A WLB spokesman said he knew of no plan of the army to take over the plant.

The I. W. A. called the strike at the lumber plant after charging three workmen were fired because of membership in the I. W. A. The plant has a labor contract with the rival AFL.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Prospect of a settlement in the Rayonier plant strike at Hoquiam, Wash., are increasing, a CIO International Woodworkers of America spokesman said today.

Ed Benedict, I. W. A. official, said the workmen were willing to comply with a War Labor board order to return to the job if they were given "the understanding that there will be no further discrimination from the company or the AFL."

people the news today of the British foreign office's denial of a peace proposal meeting as reported by Pravda's Cairo correspondent Monday, but made no editorial comment.

At the same time the press printed a story from London quoting the London Sunday Times, which said under an Ankara dateline that German peace proposals were in fact made two

refused to relay them to the allies, it said similar proposals were made in Lisbon and Stockholm.

Many Russians who may have to some extent discounted the original story now are convinced that the British have been listening—if nothing else—to peace proposals from Germany.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—British newspapers, which yesterday expressed high indignation over Pravda's publication of a rumor of British-German peace talks appeared placated today by the Moscow radio's broadcast of the official British denial.

The London Daily Mail, which yesterday called the communist party organ's account "an insult to the British people," headlined its story today: "Peace? Lie Is Now Dead." The New Chronicle said the Germans were spreading peace talk rumors, "hoping to gain respite."
