Food Price Subsidy Plan Faces Showdown

offer it without change in the senate.

The \$1,500,000,000 figure represents the estimate of Price Administrator Bowles and other stabilization officials of the cost of maintaining consumer food prices at present levels through 1944.

Among amendments waiting to be offered are measures that would limit subsidy payments by abolishing "rollback" type payments on beef and butter, and subsidize only the food bills of low income families through a stamp plan.

Muster-Out Pay Voted

Legislation providing for payment of a maximum of \$300 to men and women of the armed forces upon their honorable discharge was passed yesterday by the house and returned to the senate.

The \$300 will be payable to all service men and women whose base pay is not more than \$200 a month and who have served 60 days or more, provided they did not serve as students and did not obtain discharge at their own request to return to private employment.

Those who have served less than 60 days will receive \$100 under provisions of the house measure, which amended a senate bill providing a sliding scale from \$200 to \$500. Should the senate refuse to accept the house changes, the measure will go to conference.

Aid to Latin America Again Rapped by Butler

"I was not 95 per cent wrong and five per cent right, but 95.5 per cent right and 4.5 per cent wrong," Butler said today in a prepared address. "That is as near right as any mortal could hope to be in checking new deal expenditures."

"There is boondoggling in our operations in Latin America," he reiterated. "There is a vast amount of it. . . ."

Added Outlays Cited

He said the \$5,733,953,543 represented total war and non-war outlays and obligations in south and Central American republics, exclusive of the United States possessions—the Canal Zone, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

where, he added, another \$622,806,970 was expended in fiscal 1942, 1943 and 1944. The figures, he said, were independently audited.

"That total of \$6,396,760,504 is only the documented, certified total," he said. "That is the amount we can be absolutely sure of."

"How much more there is no one can say. . . . The sums of money for which no public accounting is made are too vast. The technique of concealment is

too well developed. The dark art of financial double-talk has been too well mastered. . . ."

Butler toured 22 Latin American republics last year.
