Dorothy Maynor, famous negro soprano, will be presented in the first concert of the Community Concert association in Roseburg, Saturday evening, January 29. Only members of the association will be admitted to the concert. Memberships can be purchased this week only, as the campaign will close at 2 o'clock Saturday, January 22. Adult memberships are \$5.50 and student memberships are \$2.20, including the tax.

Fate has marked Dorothy Maynor with a voice that just would be heard. For its discovery, those who hear her in concert, can thank a handful of people—the choir director who "tricked" her into majoring music, the far-sighted woman who arranged scholarships and finances to continue her study, the friends who wangled a grudging audition from the Boston Symphony Orchestra's famed conductor, Serge Koussevitzky, and, of course, Koussevitzky himself who instantly recognized her remarkable talents and brought her to the world's attention. Dorothy Maynor, today has received acclaim throughout the nation as having the finest soprano voice of her race.
