

R. H. S. Hoopsters Defeat Ashland in Bill Opener, 31-22

The Roseburg Indians will endeavor tonight to assure themselves a top spot in league standings, which will result if they can repeat last night's victory over the Ashland Grizzlies. In a very rough and fast battle, the Indians took a 31 to 22 win, pulling into the lead late in the second half after a rugged start in which the score was tied seven times.

There were four ties in the first quarter which ended with an 8-all standing. The count was

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knotted three times in the second period but near the close of the quarter the Indians pulled into the lead and were ahead 19 to 15 at the half.

Roseburg returned from the rest period to widen their margin to eight points, 27 to 19, in the third period, playing a deliberate holding game in the final frame to protect their lead.

The Indians showed a vast improvement in ballhawking over their previous contests, and also dominated the recoveries from the backboard.

The two teams play again tonight at the Roseburg high gymnasium starting at 8 o'clock.

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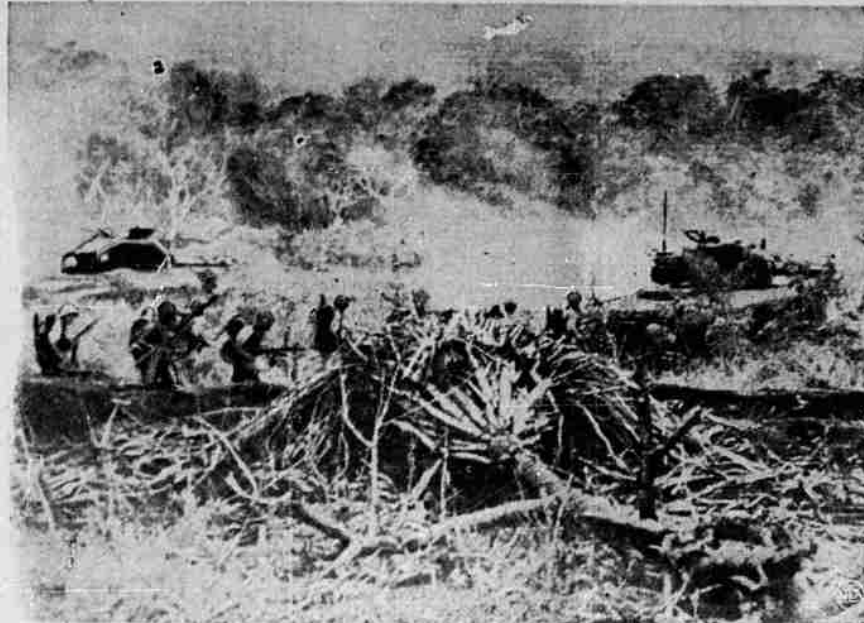
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Marines and Tanks Battle for New Britain Airfield

House to the president. Quigley said he received only a non-committal "Oh."

There was one piece missing in the almost complete picture puzzle—the identity of the vice presidential candidate.

Two potential candidates, Vice President Henry A. Wallace, and Speaker Sam Rayburn (Tex.) of the house, were on the program for tonight's \$100-a-plate Jackson day dinner which will wind up the committee's meeting. Wallace had a five-minute time allotment without a broadcast. Rayburn was down for 15 minutes, with the radio carrying his message.

Although there have been reports that Wallace might be dropped from the ticket as a political liability, the vice president showed unexpected strength among delegates. Former Gov. Culbert L. Olson, a national committeeman, said California's delegation would be for his nomination. Jake More, Iowa state chairman, said Wallace's home state would support him. Other state representatives said Wallace would be acceptable if he is the president's choice.

Immediately after his election as chairman, Hannegan tendered his resignation as internal revenue commissioner and President Roosevelt accepted it, effective today.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau designated Harold N. Graves, assistant commissioner, to be acting internal revenue Graves, assistant commissioner.

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toll of ship losses may have caused a serious break in the Tokyo supply line.

At Hansa bay, north of Madang, bombers attacked supply and gun locations and sank 20 barges, while P-51s wiped out 160 enemy troops in destroying barges carrying them to Madang.

American bombers delivered four new blows in the Marshalls, raiding two islands and damaging a Japanese cargo-transport vessel. Two of the raiders failed to return.

Only Japanese interception reported today came in an attack on the enemy seaplane base on Amboina island in the Dutch East Indies, 600 miles north of Australia. Two liberators were shot down, but at least five Japanese planes were destroyed.

Nazi Power Crippled.

A spokesman for the allied Mediterranean airforce announced today that an allied air campaign had knocked out all "airfields in the Rome area except one."

The bombings also blocked all railroads in the Leghorn area except one, while "rail blocks in the Rome area are for the most part effective," the spokesman added.

In the Balkans, Marshal Tito's partisans said German attacks had been repulsed in Croatia, and that the Yugoslavs had hit out in their own offensives. Budapest said strong German reinforcements had arrived in Bulgaria.

Farm Wage Control Ordered by Food Czar

operations for certain designated areas. Wages considered substandard will not be affected. However, ceilings below the \$2,400 level may be set if boards consider it necessary.

Severe Penalties Set.
Increases in pay above the \$2,400 level would be permitted only with the approval of the food administrator, except in cases of increases above \$5,000, where control rests with the commissioner of internal revenue.

WFA officials said the farm wage regulations would subject violators to severe penalties. Under provisions of the stabilization act, maximum penalty is a fine of \$1,000, and imprisonment for a year. Both employers and employees would be liable.

The regulations also prohibit reductions in wage rates below the highest wage or salary paid for the particular work between January 1, 1942, and September 15, 1942.
