

B. F. Negley Dies As Result of Fall

B. F. Negley, 87, well known Roseburg resident, died at Mercy hospital Sunday as the result of a broken hip suffered in a fall last week at his home. Born in Ripley county, Indiana, May 11, 1856, he was married to Emma Miles at Hartford City, Indiana, September 13, 1882.

With his family, he moved to Roseburg in 1902 and, in 1911, moved to a farm near Cottage Grove. A serious accident caused his retirement in 1926, when he again moved to Roseburg. Since the death of his wife, January 20, 1930, he had made his home with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Applewhite.

He leaves a son, Clayton Negley; a daughter, Mrs. Applewhite; two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. C. A. Edwards at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday. Services will be concluded at the Masonic cemetery.

Wimberly on Postwar Educational Committee

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Oregon Dads were pledged today to aid the university's post-war educational program and to aid Oregon Mothers in establishing a permanent memorial scholarship in honor of Dr. Donald M. Erb, late president.

At the annual Dads' day Saturday, they also voted to ask Oregon's congressmen and senators to work for passage of bills for the financial aid of honorably discharged veterans who wish to continue their education at the university.

Eugene Van Deneynde, Salem, was elected president; Loy W. Rowling, Eugene, vice-president; John H. Carlin, Salem, secretary—all for two-year terms. Judge Carl E. Wimberly, Roseburg; Carl Engdahl, Pendleton, and Stewart Weiss, Sweet Home, were among those named to the executive committee.

F. R. Pardons General in Hawaii Contempt Case

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—A justice department official said today that President Roosevelt has granted an unconditional pardon to Lieut. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, Jr., commanding general of the army's Hawaiian department, cited for contempt of court last year for refusing to comply with a writ of habeas corpus.

The case grew out of a conflict between civil and military authorities in Hawaii over the question whether the right of habeas corpus operates under partial martial law.

The writ issued by Federal Judge Metzger in Honolulu called on General Richardson to present in court two prisoners of German ancestry held by the army.

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His Mill Distributes Big Payroll

Initial units were constructed in the midst of the hard times of the Thirties, and these have been added to continuously since then until the plant now covers a large area and boasts modern equipment throughout.

Its eight-hour cutting capacity ranges from 120,000 to 147,000 feet; about 125 men are employed at the mill, another 100 in its woods east of Sutherlin. E. C. Plummer, office manager, informed me that its payroll distributes over \$50,000 per month.

Land Bank Buys in Douglas Bond Drive

An investment of \$21,000 in War Bonds by the Federal Land bank of Spokane has been credited to Douglas county. R. L. Strickle, secretary-treasurer of the Roseburg group of the National Farm Loan association, revealed today.

yesterday. But American Spitfires intercepted a force of 50 to 60 enemy planes which attempted to bomb ships off the beaches and shot down six Nazi bombers near Elba.

Writing from a beachhead yesterday, Associated Press War Correspondent Don Whitehead declared:

"To a non-military observer it appears that if the surprise landing can be exploited quickly, the enemy can be bottled up at Cassino and Rome may fall as a reward for the operation."

Blows On Other Fronts
U. S. Marauders and RAF medium bombers attacked north France. British Mosquito planes out loss by night and mined bombed western Germany with enemy waters.

Yugoslav partisans fought a bloody battle for Senj, coastal town 35 miles south of Fiume. The Bulgarians assembled a powerful police force to suppress revolt, demonstrations and sabotage, the Sofia radio announced.

The Aussies, who killed at least 100 enemy troops in the engagement, are now about 40 miles from the Japanese air and shipping base of Madang.

vanced by President Roosevelt as a part of his new legislative program.

Associated Press reporters interviewed 16 of the 18 members of the senate military affairs committee considering the labor conscription law and came away with this score:

Five against it, one for it, nine "undecided." Of the latter group, however, at least five showed by their reaction that they are more inclined to oppose than to support the bill. One declined to comment but opponents count him on their side. Two committee members were out of town.

Secretary of War Stimson will appear before the committee Wednesday to take up where he left off last week in his espousal of the legislation, which would permit the drafting of men and women for work in essential war

plants. Stimson argued for three hours last week but he failed to arouse much enthusiasm among committee members.

"A bill of that kind would do more harm than good," said Senator Murray (D-Mont). "It would be a smear on the whole production record in this country."

"I don't think we need it," declared Senator Truman (D-Mo.), chairman of the war costs investigating committee.

Those not committing themselves included Holman of Oregon.
