Negotiated Peace Advocates Under Dies Board Probe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26—(AP)—Chairman Dies said today that the house committee on un-American activities is investigating "Peace Now," an organization he described as advocating a negotiated termination of hostilities.

How far the investigation has progressed, Dies declined to disclose. He said his committee principally wanted "to find out who is putting up the money to finance this organization."

Officers of the organization reported yesterday their offices in New York had been looted of letters from Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) and copies of letters which had been sent to other prominent men, including former President Herbert Hoover, Charles A. Lindbergh and General Robert Wood.

In New York, Miss Bessie Simon, secretary of Peace Now, said that she wished "the Dies committee would come around so this nonsense about the organization would stop."

"We are happy to have the Dies committee come here and investigate everything," she said. "All our financial records are open, and as of Jan. 1, we had spent about \$2,500 which was given to us by individuals who simply wanted to join in the work for a negotiated peace."

Birthday Ball for Paralysis Fund to Be Held Tonight

The President's Birthday ball, a benefit for the Infantile Paralysis foundation, will be held tonight at the Oriental gardens under sponsorship of the Roseburg Business and Professional Women's club.

Music for the ball is being donated by Casey Jones' orchestra, and the use of the dance hall is contributed by A. J. Hochradel. The dance will start at 9 o'clock and all proceeds will be devoted to the infantile paralysis fund, of which one-half will be retained for work in Douglas county, while the balance will go to the national foundation to be used for continuing research. In the event county funds are not sufficient for local needs, aid can be secured through national headquarters, so that all or more than the amount of money raised through the series of benefits can be utilized locally if the need arises.

Sponsorship of the drive in Roseburg and the immediate area has been assumed by the Roseburg Business and Professional Women's club, which is inviting the general public to participate in tonight's event.
