CAMP AND AUXILIARY TO MEET AT DINNER

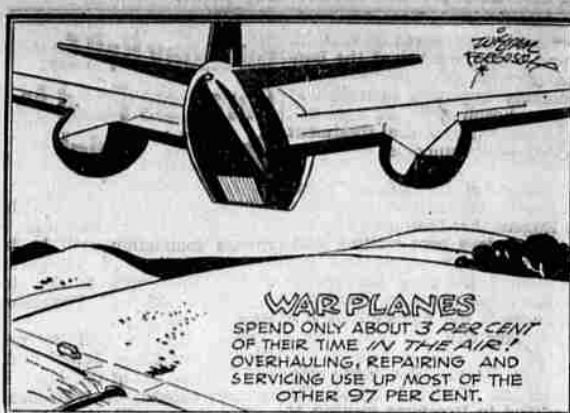

CONTAINER LACK WARNING

It will be necessary for used wooden containers to fill a 10 to 20 per cent gap this year if 1944 crop yields are normal, the War Food administration advises. Container salvage will be of great importance to fruit and vegetable growers and handlers. The outlook also is dark for egg crates of all kinds, meat packing boxes, open mesh bags and similar containers. The shortage of wooden containers is due to a general scarcity of commercial wood and lumber products and to the fact that use of lumber for packaging and shipping has increased over 300 per cent since the war started.

RATIONING CALENDAR

(Clip and keep for handy reference.)

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) for purchase of meats-fats, etc.
JANUARY 29 — Expiration date of brown stamps R, S, T and U.

Each weekly series good for 16 points.

FEBRUARY 26 — Expiration date of brown stamps V, W and X. V series valid on January 23, W on January 30, and X on February 6.

RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)
Green stamps G, H and J valid to February 20.

SUGAR

MARCH 31—Expiration date of stamp 30, in Book Four, good for 5 pounds.

SHOES

Stamp No. 18, book one, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES

Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL

Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL

FEBRUARY 8, 1944—Expiration date of period 2 coupons which became valid November 30.

MARCH 14—Expiration date of period 3 coupons.

GASOLINE

MARCH 21—Expiration date of No. 10 stamps.

Value of gasoline coupons—A, B1, C1, 3 gals.; B2, C2, R and T, 5 gals.; D, 1.5 gals.; E, 1 gal.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

PRICE CONTROL

Refer price inquiries and complaints to the price clerk of your local war price and rationing board.

USED FATS

Each pound of waste fat is good for two meat-ration points.
