The Roseburg high school Indians left today for Grants Pass, where they will play basketball games against the Cavemen tonight and Friday.

The team will be without the services of Merlin Anderson, who has been called into military service. Anderson left yesterday from four days rest, but probably will not be able to resume his studies nor participate in any of the remaining basketball games.

Services of Ward Cummings, star guard, however, are assured for the remainder of the season. Cummings returned last night from four days spent at Seattle, where he was sworn in as a member of the naval aviation reserve. He will be permitted to finish out his school year and probably will not be called into service until July.

Status Causes Worry
The uncertainty of military status is believed to have been one of the reasons for the in-and-out performance of the team this season. Coach Turner reports that several of the players approaching military age have been mentally disturbed by the uncertainty of whether they would continue their studies through the school year and have been unable to keep their minds centered upon school work and sports.

No further changes in personnel are anticipated during the balance of the season, and it is expected that the determining of definite status of those eligible for service will have a steadying effect upon the entire basketball squad.

Realty Profits Require Entry on Tax Blank

The numerous real estate sales in Douglas county during the past year are complicating income tax returns, Ray B. Compton, local attorney, reported today. Persons who have sold real estate at a profit, he states, are required to report these sales on schedule B, form 1040, covering capital gains and losses. Some taxpayers, he states, apparently are of the opinion that the profit from such sales can be reported on the forms covering salaries and wages, but complications may be expected unless schedule B is used.
