

Use Green Stamps Ahead of Blue Ones, Consumers Advised

Green stamps K, L, and M in War Ration Book 4 will be used by consumers for buying processed foods from February 1 through March 20, the district OPA announced today.

These are the last green stamps on the page, and also the last green stamps that consumers will use for the time being. The new blue stamps, to be used with ration tokens, come into use on February 27.

Between February 27, when the blue stamps become valid, and March 20, when the old green stamps run out, consumers may use both sets of stamps for a single purchase. Tokens will be given in change for both colors of stamps.

Since the green stamps expire long before the blue, consumers are advised to spend their green stamps first. After March 20 processed foods will be bought with blue stamps and blue tokens.

Although using two series of processed foods stamps at the same time may make rationing somewhat more complicated, it

will provide both consumers and dealers with stamps of varying denominations to make purchases while tokens are coming into use. Green stamps will continue to have the same point value as at present—8, 5, and 1 points; the new blue stamps will have a uniform point value of ten.

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states to make absentee ballots available to personnel was "a fraud upon the American people," Millikin said the pending administration measure contained "fraud-inviting" provisions.

Millikin's attack on the measure followed an assertion by Senator Capper (R., Kans.) that he was growing "suspicious" of what he described as administration attempts to use the war emergency "for the purpose of centralizing control of the American people in Washington."

He charged the pending bill attempted to by-pass the constitutional guarantees of local control of elections.

4th Term Scheme Seen. Senator Taft denounced the proposed federal ballot, declaring it was linked with plans for a fourth term for President Roosevelt.

"Under this ballot plan 10 million American soldiers would be lined up at the polls in

much the same way we used to see WPA workers lined up at the polls," Taft told the senate. "They'll be told 'here, vote this ballot.'"

"The ballot was got up so the election of president would dominate the election of members of congress. There will be no names on the ballot. Of course, everyone knows the name Roosevelt, but they probably wouldn't know who was running for congress. If they voted for the president it would be natural for them to write in 'democrat' for senator or congressman without knowing in many cases for whom they were voting."

Poll to Be Demanded.

More than 100 house members have pledged themselves to demand a record vote on the federal ballot bill of Rep. Worley (D., Tex.) and to vote for that measure if they succeed in defeating the states' rights bill reported by a house elections committee.

The Worley bill, similar to the bill introduced in the senate by Senators Green and Lucas would provide a uniform federal ballot for voting for president, vice-president, senators and representatives. The elections committee measure would provide that the states handle the ballots and would permit service men to vote, its supporters say, for all offices from president to constable.

Japs' Return to West Opposed by Mayors

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Mayor Fletcher Bowron says mayors of large Pacific coast cities have sent a joint protest to Lt. Gen. Emmons, western defense command chief, against any return of Japanese to the coast.

Back from a Chicago meeting of mayors, Bowron told news-

"We were informed from reliable sources that feelers were being put out to see how the people of the Pacific coast areas would react to a plan to return the Japanese to their former homes."

He said the mayors' letter to Emmons declared that such a step would be harmful to the coast's war effort. Emmons replied there was "no change contemplated in existing exclusion policies by this headquarters," the Los Angeles mayor disclosed.

toward Cassino. Yugoslav Success Reported. Yugoslav partisans, skilled in the art of mountain warfare, have liberated 70 per cent of Central Bosnia from the German invaders, headquarters of Marshal Broz (Tito) announced today.

In western Croatia, Yugoslav patriots were said to have ambushed five high ranking German officers, wiping them out on the spot and capturing important military documents.

The Berlin radio claimed the capture of the island of Hvar off the northern Dalmatian coast and said that 19 days of recent fighting had cost the partisans more than 21,000 casualties against undisclosed nazis losses.

Flour Subsidy Payments Given Second Advance

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—(AP)—The second advance in flour subsidy payments, designed to enable millers to pay market prices for wheat and continue to sell flour at ceiling prices below the present wheat equivalent, was announced last night by the Defense Supplies corporation.

The subsidy for February, increased from 13 cents to 6 cents a bushel, will be:

For wheat ground outside the Pacific coast area—hard wheat, 22 cents a bushel, up 11 cents a bushel; soft wheat, 12 cents, up 21 cents; durum wheat, 16 cents, up 43 cents.

For wheat ground on the west coast—24 cents a bushel straight through, up 6 cents.
