Dr. Kabisch is a man of broad religious experience, having been pastor for 13 years of the Kennedy Heights Presbyterian church in Cincinnati, Ohio, the Rev. Mr. Ross reports. He also has taught church history and Christian evidences in the Open Bible Theological seminary, Des Moines, Iowa, and has served as synodical representative for the Presbyterian church in Indiana.

In recent years Dr. Kabisch has been affiliated with the Assembly of God. He has a reputation for being a forceful speaker, presenting the Bible in a most vivid and practical manner to those of all ages, Rev. Mr. Ross states.

"There will be special services for divine healing, with announcements concerning the dates for such meetings to be announced from the pulpit," the pastor stated.
