PORTLAND, Jan. 28 — (AP)—Oregon's fourth war loan reached \$18,655,650 of the \$99,000,000 quota today with "E" bond sales accounting for \$9,409,653.

Jefferson county continued to set the pace for the state with 107 per cent of its total quota. It previously had been first to reach its "E" bond goal.

Doomed Oregon Negro Admits 2 More Killings

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28. — (AP)—State Prison Warden Alexander announced today that Harvey Cunningham, negro sentenced to die March 6 for a murder in Portland, has confessed killing to death two negroes in Kansas City, Mo., in 1941.

Cunningham is sentenced to die for shooting to death Richard F. Keer, Portland, a white man, on a Portland street Aug. 29, 1942. The two men had an argument, but the subject of the argument never was learned.
