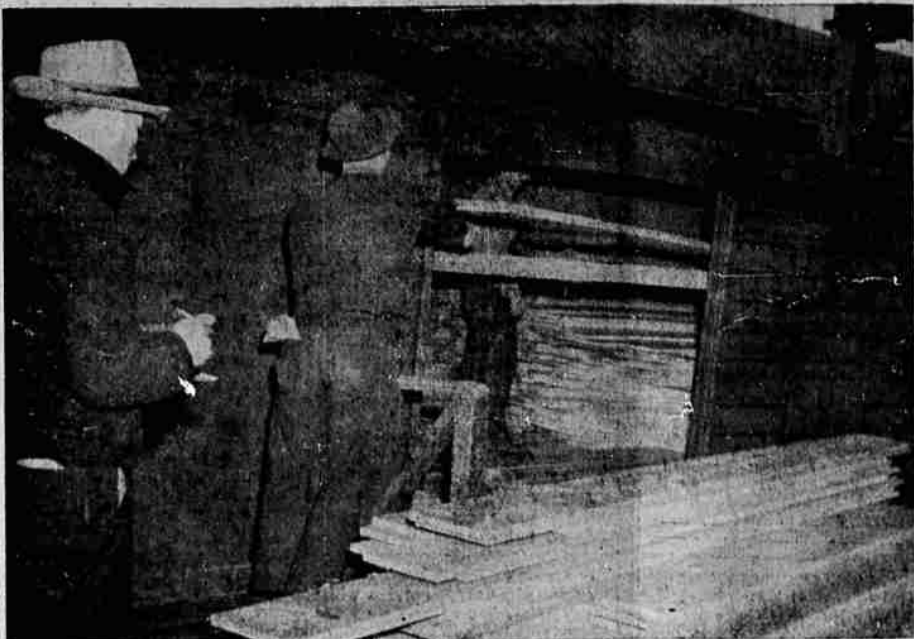

## Roseburg Lumber Started on Industrial Journey

Pictured above are Carl Henry, Ralph Stratton and Eddie Nicholls as they load a railway car with lumber at the Roseburg Lumber company sawmill in East Roseburg. Each car holds approximately 40,000 feet. From three to four are loaded daily, on a five-day a week basis.

The lumber is delivered to the loading platform by a hoisting truck; its grade is noted; it is swung into the car by means of the roller seen in the door and placed in the car as best to utilize the maximum space, a job calling for no small amount of skill.

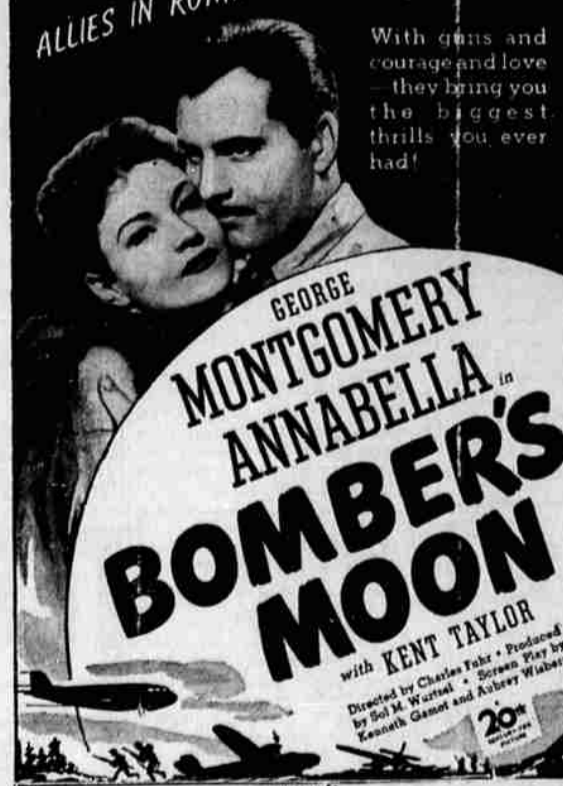
