

Winter Fishing for Steelhead, North Umpqua, Restored

At a meeting of the Oregon State Game commission at Portland last Saturday, at which angling regulations for 1944 were formulated, the special season of June 1 to October 31 on the upper part of the North Umpqua was abolished and this section of the river, therefore, will be open to winter fishing for steelhead over twenty inches.

The six-inch trout season will open on April 15 and close October 31. The bag limit remains the same as before, 15 fish or 15 pounds and 1 fish in any one day but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and 2 fish in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

For Diamond Lake a minimum length limit of ten inches was established, but the 1943 bag limit of 5 fish and season from May 20 to September 20 will be in effect.

Effective February 1 will be the new regulations on steelhead and salmon over 20 inches in length. In the coastal streams the bag limit was five fish a day, but now the limit in all sections will be three fish a day or nine in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time. There will be no bag limit, however, on jack salmon under twenty inches in length.

Isolation. Taft declared the speaker and majority leader of the house had blocked floor consideration until today of a senate-passed "state's rights" bill, which President Roosevelt denounced last week as "a fraud."

"The proponents of the war ballot plan have done everything they can to stall," Taft charged. "The bill in the house could have been passed two weeks ago."

The senate wrangle came as debate was reopened on a bill by Senators Green and Lucas, which would send a uniform absentee federal ballot to everyone in uniform. The bill is almost identical to one defeated in the senate in December when the "states' right" measure was passed, leaving absentee voting up to the states.

"I don't suggest there has been a deliberate effort to postpone or delay," Barkley told the senate. "But this is a simple issue. I dare say everybody knows now how he's going to vote."

of Cassino today as the entire enemy defenses in this key corridor to Rome began to crumble.

The nature of extensive and powerful enemy fortifications was disclosed with capture of numerous German troops, including officers, Boyle added.

Some prisoners complained they had been in the line two days without food, indicating that air attacks on German communication lines were giving the nazis "a major supply problem," Boyle said.

Photographs showed 80 planes were destroyed on the ground in allied raids Sunday on German air bases, principally in northeastern Italy, bringing the toll for five days of air war to 251 German planes wrecked in the air and ground.

Italian Cities Bombed
Allied planes meanwhile smashed at airfields at Klagenfurt, in southern Germany, and at Udine and Aviano in northern Italy.

(A Berlin broadcast said extensive fires were set at Udine and other northern Italian cities.)

On the main Fifth army front to the south, American, British, and French forces surged forward at many points despite repeated German counterblows. The British took Mt. Natale about a mile northwest of Minturno on the western end of the line. The Americans took 250 prisoners north of Cassino.

Eighteen German planes were destroyed during the day for a loss of four allied aircraft.

Bombers blasted a railway in the Adriatic port of San Benedetto while fighters lashed at the Germans in support of the advancing allied ground forces.

Flying Fortresses with Lightning and Thunderbolt escorts caught German defenses flat-footed at Klagenfurt, covering the field, hangars and workshops with a shower of bombs. They did

not meet a single fighter or any flak, and pilots said many fires were started, with three hangers probably destroyed.

Other Flying Fortresses and Liberators with Lightning and Thunderbolt protectors shot down 16 enemy planes in blows at Udine, 60 miles northeast of Venice, and Aviano, 45 miles above Venice. It was the second consecutive attack upon Udine.

Sixteen other planes were destroyed around.

These three bases are of vital importance to Nazi long-range fighters and bombers.

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State Powers Of Governor Upped by California Solons

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Greater powers than any other California governor ever held over the state's prison and juvenile correction systems are today, or will be 90 days hence, in the hands of Governor Warren.

The legislature, which yesterday completed his special session program, passed the bill for a constitutional amendment which he asked to enable the state to tax federally-owned property in California providing congress consents and enacted a soldier voting bill which the governor said "suits me."

The latter measure had incorporated in it the plan for merging the May presidential and August state primaries, to save an estimated \$2,500,000 in election costs and facilitate the counting of absentee ballots.

Under the penological reform measure the governor can: Appoint most of the members of the several boards which comprise the over-all setup comprising the department of corrections.

Name all the wardens of the state prisons, subject only to senate confirmation, and designate the \$10,000-a-year director of corrections who is to be a general manager of penal affairs.

He can remove a warden at will, subject only to the requirement that charges shall be filed with the board of corrections.

panese plane losses at Rabaul mounted to more than 550 for January as Solomon-based allied raiders destroyed an additional 36 in damaging sweeps over the New Britain base Saturday.

Vice Adm. Aubrey W. Fitch, commander of the South Pacific air force, declared that the Japanese will attempt to withdraw key personnel and vital equipment when the cost of defending Rabaul became too high.

"I can't say when it will be knocked out," he commented, "but we're on schedule."

Allied bombers sank two 2500-ton Japanese freighters and 750-ton cargo ship at Hansa bay on the northeast coast of New Guinea. To the south, Australian troops pushed to within 30 miles of American forces who landed at Saldor January 2 in a move menacing the big Japanese base at Madang.

Spotlighting the speed with which Japan constantly reinforced Southwest Pacific air force is meeting piecemeal destruction, a South Pacific naval spokesman today reported 1,450 enemy planes downed in the past six months.

Instead of 2, money order, registered mail fees and other special postal charges will be higher.

If the bill becomes law by Feb. 19, the new excise rates take effect March 1. The postal increases become effective 30 days after enactment.

Earned Credit Erased
Individual income taxpayers no

longer will get the benefit of a 10 per cent earned income credit in computing their normal tax. Neither will they be allowed to deduct federal excise taxes they have paid. The victory tax becomes a straight 3 per cent tax on every dollar of income over \$624 a year, regardless of family status.

But the income tax changes will operate only in the 1944 tax year and will not affect computations on the 1943 returns due next March 15.

Despite the insistence of the White House and the treasury for still heavier taxes (the present bill falls far short of the administration's \$10,500,000,000 request) responsible lawmakers see no change for sharply increased rates in 1944.
