Ickes Raps War Profiteers; Urges Bigger Fish Catch

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—"For a great many Americans this has been an exceedingly comfortable war," said Secretary Harold Ickes today and he then proceeded to lambaste war profiteers.

"I can remember a few years back when we were examining the record of the last 'World war,' Ickes said in an address prepared for delivery before representatives of the fishing industry, "that it was being widely said that if we ever had another war, there would be no profits in it. 'And look at us now! All that is missing is the candy-striped silk shirt.'"

Ickes, who is coordinator of fisheries, bluntly told the fishing leaders gathered here for discussions of the 1944 program that he felt the industry had not done its best in 1943.

He recalled that last year the industry was told it must produce more than six billion pounds of fish and shellfish to meet 1943 requirements, and that actual production was probably somewhat less than four billion.

This year, Ickes said, many handicaps have been removed—submarines were driven off, a good many vessels are being returned to the industry by the navy, nearly 600 new fishing boats are being built—and if the industry now does not increase its production substantially, "it will lack the convenience of an adequate excuse."

Spain Unlikely to Break With Axis

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Both pro-Franco elements among Spaniards here expressed doubt today that Generalissimo Francisco Franco would go to the extent of breaking off Spain's diplomatic relations with the axis despite American-British economic and diplomatic pressure.

Franco's adherents, who profess neutrality, argued that the Germans across the border in France are a more serious immediate menace to Spain than are the United States and Britain at a distance, even with their power of blockading Spain from the sea.

Among the developments in the situation was a broadcast by

the German-controlled radio saying the allies had threatened to cut off Spain's food supplies and had told Franco he must "submit or fight."

In Madrid, newspapers carried on their front pages a brief Washington dispatch that "the American department of state in accord with the British government gave an order for shipments of petroleum for Spain in the month of February to be suspended, according to an official communiqué."

The newspapers made no comment and gave no further details.

Klamath Falls Cagers Trim Grants Pass, 36-21

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Klamath Falls put on a scoring bee in the last quarter of the basketball game here last night to register a victory over Grants Pass, 36 to 21.

At the quarter Grants Pass was leading, 7 to 5. At the half Klamath Falls was ahead 15 to 9 and at the third quarter still was leading 19 to 15. Half a minute later Grants Pass scored 2 points but Welch and Conroy of Klamath Falls then began to run wild and Klamath Falls scored 17 more points while the best Grants Pass could do was 4.

Smith, Grants Pass, usually a high scorer could only connect for 3 points while Welch of Klamath Falls chalked up 18.

Oregon U. Basketeers Defeat Cougars, 40-36

PULLMAN, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team, which climbed from the northern division cellar only last week, settled comfortably in third place today by virtue of a 40-36 victory last night over Washington State here.

Center Wally Borrevick scored 19 points to show the Webfoet the way. He counted 11 of them in the first half during a touch-and-go period in which the lead changed hands eight times before the visitors pulled ahead to a 21-15 halftime lead.

Leave Granted Hockett, Accident Board Agent Here

Mr. and Mrs. Hockett have resided in Douglas county for several years and expect to make Roseburg their permanent home. They reside at the Kohlhaugen apartments at present.
