New School Building at Riverside Projected

accommodate all in one building.

The proposed new building would take the load off Benson and Fullerton schools and permit a diversion of some of the pupils from Rose school, eliminating congestion.

A complete survey of the school district and its anticipated needs is being made by C. N. Freeman of Portland, a member of the firm of Freeman and Hayship, architects, who have been specializing in school construction. Mr. Freeman is working in cooperation with Lester A. Wilcox of the state department of education in gathering the data needed to support the district's application for federal aid.

Funds Must Be Voted
The Roseburg community has been officially proclaimed a defense area, which was necessary before public and private emergency housing could be undertaken, thus making the district eligible for aid under the Lanham act. It is anticipated, however, that it will be necessary for the voters of the district to provide funds, either by a bond issue or millage levy, to provide funds to cooperate in the construction program.

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If authorized, before the proposed building can be erected.

It is hoped, the school board reports, that preliminary work can be completed in time to submit a measure to the voters at the May primary election.

The proposed new building would occupy a site utilizing the property of the old Riverside school, abandoned a number of years ago, together with the newly acquired block. It would be constructed of fireproof materials and would provide either five or six classrooms. Heating plant and service installations would be arranged to accommodate a larger building and the structure would be designed with a view of building additional wings as needed.
