Crop-Feed Loan Applications May Now be Submitted

V. N. Freeman, field supervisor for the southwestern Oregon district, Emergency Crop and Feed Loan division of the Farm Credit administration, announces that crop and feed loans are to be made available during 1944 under the same terms as prevailed during 1943.

Loans, he reports, are made for the purpose of buying seed and fertilizer, and to meet other expenses incident to crop production including repairs to machinery and equipment. Funds may be used also for the purchase or raising of feed for livestock. Security for such loans is a first lien on the crops to be financed or the livestock to feed. The maximum amount of any individual loan is \$400 and the rate of interest is 4 per cent per annum. Loan checks are usually delivered within 10 days after the application is completed. "The fact that an applicant owes balances on old crop or feed loans will not in itself prevent approval of a new loan, provided the reason for non-payment was beyond his control," Freeman said.

Application forms and full information are available at the office of any county agent, production credit association or at the office of V. N. Freeman, field supervisor, Room 7, Post Office building, Eugene, Oregon.

Japs Force Captive To Slay Fellow Prisoner, Report

SEATTLE, Feb. 4—(AP)—A prisoner of the Japanese was forced, at bayonet point, to kill a fellow prisoner with a shovel and bury him in a ditch along-side the scene of the "march of death," Comdr. Melvyn McCoy related last night in a national radio broadcast.

McCoy, one of a band of Americans who escaped from a Japanese camp in the Philippines, reported a fellow officer's report of the incident.

"In one case an enlisted man keeled over during the 'march of death' and the Japs dragged him to a ditch about 100 yards from the road. Another prisoner was brought over to the ditch and handed a shovel. A guard jabbed him in the ribs with his bayonet and he was made to shovel earth on the unconscious

but still living man. "He had sowed six inches of earth over him when suddenly the man regained consciousness and clawed his way out and sat up. The Japs jabbed the prisoner viciously with bayonets. He was forced to kill the man with his shovel and then finish burying him."
