Farm WAR NEWS

WAR GAS NEEDS
War needs are the argument for closest possible cooperation by farmers in holding down the consumption of both non-highway and highway use of gasoline. A 6-hour mission by 1,000 four-engine bombers uses 1,800,000 gallons of 100-octane gasoline, which from a strictly gallonage point of view operate 1500 farm tractors using 1200 gallons a year.

1944 PAYMENT DEADLINE
County farm operators who have not turned in a report of their 1943 conservation practices, or signed an application for payment, are urged to contact the county office or their community AAA committeemen within the next few weeks. March 31 is the final date for making application for payments earned under the 1943 program.

1944 RANGE PRACTICE
Improvement and conservation of rangelands to maintain peak production of war needed meat and wool is the objective of a grazing land management practice in 1944 AAA program. This practice, applicable only to units having at least 640 acres of grazing land, offers a payment of 2 cents an acre for carrying out an approved management plan, plus the cost of range improvements made, such as fencing, pipelines, supplemental water storage, stock trails and control of poisonous plants. Interested ranch operators may contact the county AAA committee for additional information on this practice, which requires the filing of a management plan before the start of the grazing season.

EGG MARKETING OUTLOOK
The armed forces and our fighting allies will probably take 20 per cent of our record egg output, according to a report on present and expected government purchases from the Food Distribution administration. Included are lend-lease purchases for dried egg shipments, which are likely to take 11 per cent of the total production. There is good consumer demand, and domestic consumption is expected to increase.

BABY CHICK OUTPUT DOWN
Commercial hatcheries reported output of baby chicks in December considerably below December of last year. Less favorable feeding rations and difficulties in obtaining feed in deficit areas were listed by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics as the factors causing the decline.

Oregon poultry goals for 1944 call for a one per cent decrease in commercial broiler production, an 8 per cent decrease in turkeys raised, and all-out egg production, with a decrease of 2 per cent thought likely for a total output of 40 million dozen.

COOLER UNITS RATIONED
Refrigeration units for immersion and tubular type farm milk coolers are added to the list of farm equipment rationed by the County Farm Rationing committee. They formerly were obtained by filing applications with the

War Production board. The change means that the refrigeration units will be obtainable with a purchase certificate instead of the WPB approval and priority formerly required.

AMMONIUM NITRATE
Ammonium nitrate is expected to be produced at the rate of 35,000 to 40,000 tons per month in 1944, according to WFA. This is a higher monthly production rate than ever reported previously, so maximum use of the fertilizer will be encouraged.

HOG PRICE SUPPORT
To protect hog growers who are unable to market at present and are forced to feed about 300 pounds, the WFA has made a temporary emergency extension of the price support program to include good to choice butcher hogs weighing 300 to 330 pounds. The second extension of the support program became effective on January 27. To help prevent market glut, the price support limit was temporarily raised to 300 pounds on December 23 from the originally announced range of 200 to 270 pounds. Growers who have feed are urged to keep hogs weighing less than 200 pounds off the market until market congestion is relieved.
