No Evidence Of Poison Found in Trio of Deaths

An autopsy conducted Monday in an investigation of the death of James T. Hart, well known Wilbur resident, failed to reveal any traces of food poisoning, local physicians reported today. Although further examination is being made in laboratory tests, it was indicated by the autopsy, it was stated, that death resulted from complications following influenza.

The coincidence of the death of Mr. Hart shortly after that of his wife, who died January 24, together with the death of a neighbor and friend, D. L. Guard, and the serious illness of Mrs. Guard, caused the investigation. No evidences of any type of food poisoning so far have been discovered, the physicians state, and, due to the widely divergent symptoms it is believed that all three deaths resulted from influenza and ensuing complications. Mrs. Guard's condition was reported to be greatly improved and her early release from the hospital at Roseburg is anticipated.

The local physicians were assisted in the autopsy by Dr. Furrer, Eugene pathologist.

Wm. W. Ackley Passes at Ogden

Word was received here today of the death at Ogden, Utah, Feb. 3, of William W. Ackley, father of Parker O. Ackley, Roseburg gunsmith, now in federal employ. Mr. Ackley was born Sept. 21, 1877, at Clarendon, Vt., and moved in 1899 to Granville, N. Y., where he was married to Ida Parker.

He and his wife moved to Roseburg in 1936 to join their son, who had earlier established business as a gunsmith. When the son moved to Ogden in 1941, following assignment to the Ogden arsenal by the army ordnance department, the elder Mr. Ackley and his wife also moved to that city. Suffering from a heart ailment, he went to Monrovia, California, for a short time last year, but received no benefit from the climate and returned to Ogden.

Surviving are the widow, the son, four grandchildren, a brother, A. M. Ackley, Granville, N. Y., and a sister, Mrs. George W. Colton, Buffalo, N. Y.

Funeral services were held Feb. 3. The body is being held in a cooling vault until spring, when it will be taken to Granville for interment in the family burial plot.

Circuit Court Term Is Deferred Until March 20

Few cases are in readiness for trial and all local attorneys will be busy with income tax returns, Judge Wimberly stated. It is anticipated that a month's delay will permit the completion of pleadings in order that sufficient work may be available for the court to justify calling a jury panel.

Test Slated At RHS For Military College Training

The third Army-Navy college qualifying test for the army specialized training program and the Navy College program V-12, which will be given throughout the country on Wednesday, March 15, at 9 a. m., will be administered at the Roseburg senior high school, C. H. Beard, principal, announced today. A leaflet of general information which contains an admission-identification form may be obtained at the senior high school office. This form properly filled out will admit to the test students between the ages of 17 and 21, inclusive, who are high school graduates or who will be graduated by July 1, 1944. Intent to take the test should be known immediately to the senior high school office in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The same examination will be taken by both army and navy candidates. The examination is designed to test the aptitude and general knowledge required for the program of college training and all qualified students are urged to take the test. At the time of the test each candidate will be given a choice of service preference, but taking the test does not obligate the candidate to enlist in the service.

The army specialized training program is aimed to meet the army's needs for specialists and technicians in certain critical fields of study. Academic work is at the college level at government expense.

The Navy college program also enables students to continue academic training at government expense. Successful completion of the prescribed courses may, following further officer training, lead to a commission in the navy.
